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

NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The Board of Directors met on December 13 at Clubhouse 3 at 3PM and on Zoom. The entire Board was present along with Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Manager Maya Landa.

Before the meeting started, President Jim Czizik introduced William Sharon and Maddy Izza from PSI Security. Manager Nancy Barlow asked them to walk us though what their routine is. Maddy, the Security Director, explained that most security companies set everything up and walk away. His company uses software called Tracktic that keeps the customer informed. All officers have body and dash cams and use a tablet to report violations and criminal activity that the customer receives in real time. Officers are tracked via GPS. Field supervisors come to the site during patrol and not during patrol which is not charged. We will have the ability to contact the company 24/7. Maddy said he was very impressed with Leisureville. Maddy wanted to hear what our concerns are. He said the company has several customers in the area. He also said he can be set up within a few days. Covid impacted the company; employees wanted more money and turnaround increased. In the last 8 months, turnaround slowed down. Directors of the company are military or law enforcement; supervisors have a gun. Mobile patrol here will have 3 different patrol men on 4 different visits; one visit will be to close the clubhouses and patrol; the other times will vary. In an emergency, the police will be called. Something very grave will be reported to the Manager immediately; a report also is automatically sent via the software. Access to the reports is always available as the reports are stored in the cloud. Hours of patrol will vary. The contract has a 30 day out.

President Jim Czizik added a discussion about the security company to the agenda. The November minutes were approved. Manager Nancy Barlow gave her Manager's Report.

Assistant Secretary Jack McQueen reported that the LCC had a luncheon in lieu of a meeting.

Director Nancy Price reported that the Recreation Committee had a tree lighting and refreshments in Clubhouse 3 and had a Menorah lighting. Tickets are on sale for a New Year's Eve dance party. A Leisureville theme song was found.

Treasurer Cliff Cole said that he and Dick Duffy inspected the sea walls to prep the Finance Committee that we have 182' to be repaired immediately. We are waiting on permits.

Secretary Bob Wilt reported that the ACC is working on 2 new policy proposals: one on driveways and one on storage containers.

Vice President Don Ernst reported that the chair and treasurer of the Tech Committee are resigning as of the first of the new year. The editor is also looking to step down; she is working with several volunteers to help her. Toys forTots was very successful.

Director Eleana Guidice reported that Gail Hogue is meeting with the Section heads in January and will be at the Welcome to Leisureville event to recruit new volunteers.

President Jim Czizik reported from the Golf Committee that the tree was planted for Jim Atkins. The bathrooms have been completed. The committee is looking for a new cart. Hot Dog Sundays are at the golf patio.

NEW BUSINESS

The Board approved the October Financials.

Treasurer Cliff Cole made a motion to amend the volunteer policy that says a committee must get Board approval for expenditures over \$2500. To spend over \$5000 the committee must get 3 bids. The Board approved.

Secretary Bob Wilt made a motion from the ACC that the lantern posts match the community. Some residents have replaced the lantern tops. Director Nancy Price does not agree that the tops should be replaced as they are costly. Bob suggested that when the house is sold the lantern be replaced when necessary to conform. Vice President Don Ernst also does not agree with the change. Resident Jim Browning replaced his coach lite for a cost of \$100 7 years ago; his glass is frosted. The main thing is we want to keep the neighborhood lit. The Board decided to table this motion. President Jim Czizik made a motion for changes to the Golf Committee policies: the chairman shall make the decision when to close the golf course; the committee shall post a fee schedule in May for use of the golf course. The cost for groups that meet weekly will be \$15; a group or committee that meets monthly to use the clubhouse and patio will be \$50. The Board approved. President Jim Czizik made a motion to appropriate an additional \$2200 for a modulator transmitter to activate channel 63. About 52% of residents use Xfinity and can access channel 63. This brings the cost up to \$4000. Resident Carol Shasha asked if those using firesticks or Roku can access this channel. They will not be able to access it. Anyone can see the channel at the clubhouses. Resident Jim Browning asked who will take charge of the information. Manager Nancy Barlow will monitor. Resident Steve Schone said it must be a pretty low percentage who will use it. Jim said it will reach those who are technically challenged. Steve feels this enables these residents Steve also added that he raised his hand to speak about the policy changes for golf that were not announced to the residents before voting. Director Hal Eide is in favor of spending this money to reach out to those residents who do not have internet. The

Board approved.

President Jim Czizik made a motion for \$35000 for the purchase of the camera system damaged by a lightning strike. Our video system is obsolete; there is uncertainty for replacement parts for the outdated system. Manager Nancy Barlow said the US government has banned the purchase of items from this Chinese company. The new system is not from China. Treasurer Cliff asked if this is the only vendor. Jim said one vendor spoke to us. This vendor can supply us in 4-5 weeks. The cost for the entire community is about \$108,000. Resident Ken Weissman asked if we got three bids. Jim said the others didn't bid; this is the only bid that can be integrated with the police. Resident Steve Palermo said it sounds like only one supplier. Vice President Don Ernst pointed out that Campbell is paying someone to lock up and open the clubhouses; presently, this facility is open and unprotected. The Board approved.

Treasurer Cliff Cole said there are 3 fines to be sent to the Fining Appeals Committee. The Board approved.

Security was discussed next. President Jim Czizik made a motion to approve a contract with PSI Security for 1 year with a 30 day out. The cost is about \$54000. Vice President Don Ernst pointed out that Manager Nancy Barlow spoke to 9 companies; none provided what PSI provides. Director Hal Eide is concerned that when the clubhouses are locked up, there will be little time for patrolling at that time. Don said GPS tracking will tell us where they go. Jim said we can communicate any needs we have; we will look closely at the reports PSI gives us. The Board approved.

Treasurer Cliff Cole wanted to discuss allowing an outside organization on our property. Mae Voelen is proposing to give a free sit-down lunch at Clubhouse 2.

Resident Ed Pollock asked about flowers around the palm trees. Manager Nancy Barlow said flowers were planted around the palm trees at Clubhouse 2. More will come in the new year.

Resident Carol Shasha asked about money owed to U3 for permits.

Resident Donna Gaudet asked about signs that state this is a 55 and older community. President Jim Czizik said we do not need signs. Jim says we have small signs that say 55+. .By Rose Luke

NOTES FROM THE BOARD WORKSHOP

The Board of Directors met for a workshop on December 6, 2022, in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3pm. All members were present or on Zoom, Jack McQueen will join the Workshop late. Along with Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Manager Maye Landa.

First topic of discussion was Board Member Mementos. Jim Czizik announced that Diana Van Boernum resigned from the board because she has sold her house and moved out of Leisureville. There is now a vacancy on the Board. There are options for putting other people on the board for 2 months' time and the likelihood that a critical vote would come up needing a majority is not going to happen. No one suggested that a replacement be appointed at this time.

First agenda item was Board Member Mementos. This is not new; it just has not been exercised in recent years. Previously, the Board has voted to allow Board Members to have shirts. Departing members would receive a memento to thank them for their service. Eleana Guidice suggested clothes are a better selection, a collared Shirt for current members. Hal Eide and Jim agreed departing members should get a memento. This will be addressed at the next board meeting.

Jim Czizik said Channel 63 was almost ready to launch when Comcast advised there is now a change of equipment requirements. We were originally told we need a modulator, now we need a modulator with transmitter. This raises the cost about \$1000 over what was anticipated from the initial investment of \$2500 if we choose to move forward with Channel 63. A less expensive modulator with transmitter is being sourced, such as a used system with a discount.

Cliff Cole provided an update on the seawalls. A seawall consulting

engineer reviewed the golf course and Leisure Lake seawalls. Currently there is 182' of seawall on the Golf Course approved to be replaced. The golf course has 1162' of seawall that needs repairs over the next year. There is an overall total of 3087' of seawall within the community. There is potential cost for \$330k to \$400k to repair the seawalls. The consultant suggested clearing out vegetation from all the seawalls and add/replace caps to help extend the seawall life by adding tiebacks to pilings where there are none and putting a nylon sleeve on the tiebacks. Leisureville Lake has 924' of seawall. Behind Condo A needs replacement of 233' and to add fabric to prevent soil erosion. There will be bids solicited for repairs to the seawalls. Don Ernst reported CAP is waiting on permits from the city for R3 grill area removal of brick walls. Eleana reported R2 renovations are also waiting for permits.

Clubhouse 2 lightning strike damage: Nancy Barlow is working with the insurance company for a settlement. Cameras are not being considered damaged from lightning, rather being damaged by Hurricane lan due to timeline change by the insurance company and paperwork submission. There have been 9 days assigned by the insurance company that they consider to be Hurricane damage, therefore not accepting a separate cause of damage by lightning.

There is a substantial increase in deductible from surge damage of \$5,000 to wind damage of \$100,000.

Holiday lighting: contracting cost is \$3500 per year for a few months to rent decorative lights. The Board is considering purchasing lights off season then rent equipment to have the lights installed by a licensed professional at a significant cost savings.

Bob Wilt provided an update on the adverse possession issue of R1 and the Golf Course. An attorney who specializes in adverse possession and has extensive knowledge of Rec Leases has been retained after the Board met with him to discuss investigating with a Title attorney.

The Golf Course and R1 are to be surveyed to start the process. Once the survey and title search information has been collected, the Board will meet again with the attorney to see if the findings will be enough to have a case to move forward.

Bob and Nancy provided an update on the Special Members meeting scheduled for January 10 at 9 am at R3 Clubhouse. Volunteers are needed to stuff envelopes so the mailing can be sent out. Looking for candidates to submit their name to the office before the 18th of December to be put in the newspaper or after that by December 30th at 4pm to run for the board. The person must be physically present to nominate anyone off the floor is there is a quorum.

Cliff discussed a policy clarification for revenue generating committees. Each committee has \$2500 to spend on a project item. Any spending over \$2500 needs to be approved by the board. The board will want 3 competitive bids. The three committees have reviewed the policy. This will be a motion at the next board meeting on December 13 at 3pm.

Nancy Barlow provided a Security replacement update. There are only two companies that are willing to provide a bid for the services we are looking for. Of the two companies, one has included extensive detail of what they can provide which may exceed our expectations. The other seems to be more of the same to what we have had in the past. The Board will review both bids to decide next steps with these two companies.

MANAGEMENT REPORT December, 2022

<u>The Administrative Team</u> welcomed 14 new property owners and 3 new rentals. The team processed work orders and provided regular member service needs. Along with daily processing of work orders, notifications, customer service requests, bookkeeping, contractor coordination, etc.

ACC Approval for Exterior Modifications – We are seeing an increase in exterior modifications in PBL without obtaining ACC approval. We are also being told the contractors are telling the owners they do not need HOA approval. Please remember you must obtain ACC approvals for any exterior modifications made to your home, according to the ACC Policy 101.7- Alterations to Basic House. Regardless of the need for a city permit, you must submit an application to the ACC. Applications are available at the admin office. We will be happy to assist you on any questions you might have on the application process. You can also attend the ACC meetings for additional questions. They meet on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month.

The <u>Maintenance Team</u> completed a total of 66 work orders while performing their daily scheduled maintenance and janitorial services.

The Irrigation Team completed a total of 42 resident work orders. Property Inspections – Home Inspections are performed year-round. For the month of November, the Team inspected 155 properties which includes LCC, ACC, Coach Lights Out and Parking violations. The following non-compliance notices were issued for the month of November: 32 Stage 1 notices, 25 Stage 2 notices, and 24 Stage 3 notices. 74 non-compliance violations were closed out. The team also completed 339 post paint & post pressure cleaning inspections. Thank you PBL's residents for maintaining your home and making a difference. Fining Appeal Committee Meeting – There was a Fining Appeal Meeting on December 2, 2022, for non-compliance violations from May 2022 through November 2022. Out of the 44 non-compliance fines levied by the Board of Directors, 25 violations were corrected prior to the 12/2/22 FAC meeting. There were 19 cases presented to the FAC to adjudicate and fines were assessed. Coastal Painting - Coastal has completed the 2022 & remaining part of the 2021 Painting & Pressure Cleaning Schedule. 522 homes were painted, and 1,062 roofs were power washed in 2022. For 2023, Section 1 & 3 roofs will be power washed & homes rinsed and Section 5&5A homes will be painted. The painting will begin in Section 5 on January 9, 2023 (weather permitting). Please have all holiday decorations and lights removed before January 9. Schedules will be posted to the website and information will be posted weekly in the Friday email blasts. Painting & pressure cleaning Notices will be posted in December. Please read the instructions and complete the notices promptly.

- During the month of December, Coastal will complete a prepainting inspection to document any damaged items and note any rotted wood for section 5, 5A and 1.
- The contractor will also pre-walk the roofs and detail and photograph number of cracked, lose or missing roof tiles.
- Without inspection approval of your roof, Coastal will not be able to offer pressure cleaning or painting roof services.
- A pre-painting form will be left on your door and must be signed by homeowner. Tenants, neighbors, and family members should not fill out this form unless the office has received an email or written request from owner stating their authorization.
- If you have any questions on the painting, power washing or prepaint inspections, please call the office at 561-732-7474 or email painting@mypblca.com

BOARD ELECTION NEWS

Very Important Dates

There are two dates coming up that are perhaps the most important days for a PBL resident. One is the Special Members Meeting and the other Election of Directors. Both meetings will determine how the Community will be administered for the next two years. It is vital that you attend these meetings in person or appoint a proxy to represent you. The purpose of the proxy you recently received is merely for the purpose of counting you in the quorum number. You are not making any other commitment.

The Special Members meeting will be Tuesday, January 10, at 10:00 a. m. in Clubhouse 3. The main purpose of this meeting is to receive the report from the Nominating Committee and to accept nominations from the floor. But nominations from the floor can only be accepted if we have at least 692 residents in attendance or submitted proxies. As of this writing we have only received three nominations for the five vacancies on the board. Thus, if more self-nominations are not received by December 31 and we do not have a quorum (692 members), we cannot take nominations at the meeting. Then we will not have an election. If there are less than nine Directors, the Board can decide to fill those vacancies or not and work with a four person board. You can prevent this from

happening.

Attend the meeting or return the proxy you should have received in the mail. Or better yet, consider running for a board position. Being a director does require some work; however, it can also be self-gratifying knowing that you contributed to the betterment of our community. You do not need any special talents, abilities, nor does it make any difference what your pre-retirement life was. In addition to the requirement or serving that were included in the mailing you received, a director needs some good old fashion common sense. If you are supportive of current Board policies or if you want to see a change then please seriously consider running, or recruit someone you would like to see directing PBLCA.

The second vital meeting will be the Annual Members Meeting on February 10th at 3:00 in Clubhouse 3. At this meeting any eligible voter who has not voted may do so and then the result of the election will be announced. Shortly after January 10 you will be receiving a packet of material from the office in which will be your ballot. Once again, it is vital to the management of our Association that you return a completed ballot or proxy. We must have at least 692 votes cast in person or by proxy. More information will be in the February issue of PBL News.

CONDO-22 ASSOCIATION

A meeting of the Condo-22 Coalition took place on Monday, December 5,2022 at 1 PM in the East Room of Clubhouse 1. There were 15 of our PBL condo associations represented. Barbara Kaczmarczyk introduced the guest speaker, the Honorable Joseph Casello, Democratic State Representative for District 90, that includes Boynton Beach.



Joe began his presentation with his own summary of his life mission to serve others. He began his life of service as a firefighter in the state of Massachusetts. After his 30-year career, he and his wife moved to Boynton Beach and became involved with our city. He served as the City Commissioner from 2013-2018. He has been a member of the Florida House of Representatives since 2018.

Joe went on to inform us that the first planning meeting of the next Legislative year will take place next week on December 12. This will be a time for committee assignments. The main topic of this brief session will be the current Insurance crisis here in Florida. He recounted his experience in a seminar that he had attended earlier on December 5th. The principle causes of this crisis are as follows:

- A. An adverse climate for Insurers. Six insurance companies have declared bankruptcy already and there is a possibility 17 others could suffer the same fate.
- B. Citizen Insurance [State owned and operated] has over 1 million claimants and will struggle to pay any of those claims. * Citizen only insures individual homes.
- C. The recent catastrophic losses resulting from Hurricanes Ian and Nicole. * The State of Florida is still paying for losses incurred by Hurricane Michael in 2018 that devastated the Panhandle region of Florida.
- D. The shear cost of claimant losses and repairs, rising cost of the materials needed, supply chain problems, and replacement value escalations.
- E. The tragedy of the Surfside Condominium collapse in June of 2021 which is giving rise to greater scrutiny of older buildings in Florida.

Joe expects that laws and how repair bills are paid will be changing under this new legislature. He sees a problem with the Super Majority of Republicans that will dominate the Florida House this session. There are 85 Republicans and only 35 Democrats in the House. The State Senate also contains a Super Majority of Republicans 28 and only 12 Democrats. We already know that we have a very strong Republican Governor in Ron De Santis. It will be difficult to put forth any proposals or reforms in light of these Super majorities.

Joe also feels that lobbyists have a very strong say in what will happen in the next 5-6 weeks of committee meetings that will precede the 2023 Legislative slated for March 7 through May 5, 2023. He also cited the fact that the State House of Representatives can only propose 7 Bills and the review committees in the Senate often squash them or modify drastically. The State Senate can sponsor more than 100 bills, but either way they have to get past many review committees and finally the Governor.

He answered some questions put forth by those present. Yes, there is a Florida State Insurance Commission situated in Tallahassee, Fl. The current Commissioner was appointed in 2016. He agreed that there should be a Catastrophic Fund to handle the ongoing threat of hurricanes along the Florida Peninsula. This concept works for the State and the individual reserves for condo associations.

An alternate insurance choice for condo associations would be to develop a plan to become Self-Insured. *Accumulation of a large contingency fund will be a challenge for any condo community."

Landscape Committee News

Happy New Year 2023 is here. The lawns and bushes are growing fast and the weeds are in a race to take over. Your maintenance fees include weed spray and bug spray for grass areas. Call the office for appointment; now is the best time of year to get weeds under control. Your weeds get cut and taken to the neighbor's yards by mowers & blowers; help stop the spread and call the office 561-732-7474 to be scheduled.

Annual inspections will be underway for the next 4-6 months. Please get your yards ready. It will save us a lot of work. The LCC inspects properties for proper maintenance. Please check your property for the following, backyards too.

- > Bushes growing over the windows.
- > Bushes above the railing at the front porch
- > Weeds overgrown in plant and flowerbeds.
- > Too many potted plants only 10 per property, max 5 per side of house.
- > Trees- only 2 per front and back, none on sides of home unless corner lot.
- > Plantings at lamp post must be kept 1 foot below light and no larger than 2' in diameter.
- > Patio privacy hedges in rear of home- 5'-6' height around patio area.
- > 2 Fruit trees are allowed in rear of home only.
- > Norfolk Island Pine Trees (Christmas tree) CAN NOT be planted.
- > Banana Trees are not permitted. Existing bananas limited to 5 trunks.
- > Coconut Trees are not permitted. Existing trees are required to have all coconuts removed in June due to hurricane season.
- > Royal Poinciana trees are not permitted. Too large canopy and invasive roots.

Leisureville Landscape Policies also follow City and State Guidelines for landscape regulations and change due to environmental impacts. To learn more, a good resource for South Florida plants is www.sfwmd. gov; look for TAB Waterwise. A booklet is available for review; contact the LCC. Plants that are not native to the area are considered exotic or invasive plants. A list can be found at www.FLEPPC.org and there is a partial list in the Waterwise Booklet as well. Unfortunately, some of the plants on the list are still sold in store local; they maybe on a watch list and not yet banned for local use.

Since this was a new panel; they were able review and pass on to the board recommendations of what they thought the board should review and act on.

Some of their accomplishments or projects in process for 2022 were new logos for the towers at Clubhouse 1 and Clubhouse 2 plus color up lighting. Another is the purchase or erection of a gazebo at Clubhouse 2 after removing the barbeque pit. This project has been tired up in permitting by the city. A third is to modify the barbeque area and install new grills at Clubhouse 3. This project has been tied up in permitting. A fourth is to install an automatic door opener at the entrance side ramp at Clubhouse 3. Again, permitting issues with city have just been rectified. As a side note: Condo owners and associations are a huge constituency in Florida. More than 27,000 condo associations represent owners of 1.52 million condominiums with nearly 3 million residents. More than a million of these condos are 30 years old.

Joe concluded his time with us by encouraging us to contact legislative workers and let our feelings/recommendations be known to them.

Following Joe Casello's departure Barbara summarized our Condo-22 involvement in the CAP committee. We have had a voice in the community governance process in 2022 and will continue to attend these meetings. If any Condo association would like some small American flags to decorate their property on national holidays, they should contact Mae Lazarus and obtain a reasonable amount for free.

Our next meeting will be Monday, January 16, 2023, when we will have attorney, Daniel Wasserstein, speak to us about debt collection and possible foreclosures. We hope to also get a legislative update regarding insurance.

Future meetings will cover "How to redo your condominium insurance policy to save money," and a review of the Raines Case and its historical impact. The Meeting was adjourned at 2:45 PM Respectfully submitted, Barbara Kaczmarczyk.

This is the first of this series about service men/women who live right here in Leisureville, who served our country during these times. Remember, these volunteers are your neighbors so remember to thank them.

BERNIE RAY – NAVY - VIETNAM 1963-1966

Bernie was a second class electrician's mate on the destroyer Hawkins (DD873). He enlisted at the age of 17 and trained in the Great Lakes. He explained he was part of a group called the "Kiddy Cruisers" – which meant if you enrolled before your 18th birthday, you were guaranteed to be out before the age of 21.

His fondest memory? "The day I met my wife, Eileen." He was stationed in New York, and since he was close to Philly, he went home for a visit. A friend invited him to a dance on Friday the 13th and there he boldly asked Eileen

to dance. She asked him if he was in school. "Nope", he said. Did he have a job? "Nope", again. Finally, he told her he was in the navy. They corresponded all during the war and got engaged when he left the service. During his training in 1963, President John Kennedy was shot so he was immediately deployed to the Freemont (PA44) and left from Norfolk headed to the Mediterranean. They were headed to the west coast when the ship collided with another destroyer around midnight, which opened a 7' cut in the bow. I asked Bernie if he was ever afraid and he said, "No, I was too young to be afraid."



When they finally arrived in Vietnam, his ship was on plane guard, firing rounds at the enemy every day, over and over, to support the Marines.

His saddest memory? Missing his family from home with no contact other than occasional letters. "We were told, just do your job – don't think! So, I did!"

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Light physical activity may help your heart

Increasing evidence suggests that all movement-even low-effort activity-counts for preventing cardiovascular disease as people age. When exercise experts discuss physical activity, they often focus on both moderate and vigorous exercise, the types that get your heart pumping; however, there is a growing appreciation that any type of activity that gets you off the couch also may benefit your heart.

One study found that doing light physical activity such as preparing a meal or even taking a walk may lower your risk of cardiovascular disease among women in their early 60's and older. "The study directly measured how much time people spent moving, using a device that recorded body movements and could assess light-intensity activity accurately," said study author Dr. Min Lee, professor of medicine at Harvard Medical School.

"Historically, light physical activity has not been well reported. People can tell you fairly well if they go for a 30-minute walk after dinner. But if you asked them how much time they spend cleaning up after a dinner or doing light housework, it is more of a guesstimate," Lee said.

"These results are another reminder to spend less time sitting and more time moving. It is especially good news for people in their 70's and 80's, who may not be able to walk briskly or do other moderate exercise," Lee added.

Sitting for long periods of time has been linked to a higher risk of obesity, diabetes, and heart disease. This sedentary behavior is becoming more common as we age. A federal survey found that in 2016, adults were sitting for close to an hour more per day than they did in 2007. "No matter what your age, replacing some of your sedentary time with light activity will likely help your heart," Lee said.

Many times, after I turn on the television to watch local news, followed by the national news, I do not want to quit watching TV to get up and exercise. The next thing I know, it is bedtime and usually too late to exercise; another night is gone. You must put it in your mindset that you will get some form of exercise.

Light-intensity activities include chores people do often anyway, such as shopping, cooking and light housework. Many hobbies, including playing music, sewing, billiards, along with doing laundry, and playing cards also count as light activity, even if you are sitting part of the time, the study said. One of the key findings reported that women who spent the most hours in light activity, an average of 5.6 hours a day, were 42% less likely to have a heart attack or die from heart disease compared with those who spent the least hours active, 3.9 hours daily, on average. The more active women were also 22% less likely to develop new cardiovascular disease. Doing volunteer work such as helping in a soup kitchen, library, or school is another good way to add more movement to your routine, the study pointed out.

Now that we are in a new year, it is a good time to start. "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step." Take that first step and start to exercise on a regular basis. You will be doing yourself a big favor as well as making you feel good.

It has been proven that even a 10-minute walk contributes to better cardiovascular fitness, plus it increases blood flow to the brain. Walking is always a win-win situation.

Golden Age Of Hollywood - George Raft



Born George Raft September 6, 1901, in Hell's Kitchen, Manhattan, his biography lists him as an actor, dancer and film producer and the son of Eva Glockner and Conrad Raft who was a department store delivery man. At the time George was born in the roughest, meanest and in one of the most violent areas of New York City. Because of his neighborhood George became close to the criminal elements and was linked to Owney Madden, owner of the famous

Cotton Club, which deepened his association with known gangsters to became a wheelman and gun thug. He began his show business career working in nightclubs.

George first attracted attention because of the unbelievable speed he could perform the Charleston. He rocketed to fame when he starred in the Howard Hawkes production of *Scarface* in 1932 which made him an overnight sensation. He followed up the next year with *The Bowery, Bolero* in 1934 and *The Glass Key* in 1935. He starred opposite future super star James Cagney in 1939's *Each Dawn I Die*, followed by the wonderful melodrama *They Drive By Night* in 1940 with Humphrey Bogart and Ida Lupino.

As fast as his star rose, it began to plummet when he refused roles in *High Sierra* and *The Maltese Falcon* which turned Bogart into a super star and probably was the best detective movie of all time. Jack Warner had considered George for the lead in *Casablanca*, that part also going to Bogart. George continued his film career with *Background to Danger* in 1943 and *Johnny Angel* two years later and *Outpost to Morocco* in 1949. However, his star started to dim and by 1950 he was rumored to be connected to the Mafia and thence found himself doing cameos. He attempted a comeback, spoofing himself in *Some Like It Hot* in 1959, but it did not reignite his flagging career.


In George Raft's final television appearance in 1980, he was pressed for some of the recipients of his generosity to struggling actors. Raft the gentleman declined several times even when pressed to give up the identity of one of the biggest television stars he boosted. That was who Raft was, ever the gentleman. When filming with Marlene Dietrich, the scene called for him to hit her and he said, "I cannot," as it was something he'd never do in real life. Shooting was held up for several days until Marlene insisted, he hit her and reluctantly he did, but years after still regretted it. George made 105 films and was usually the guy with the gun; he said he got killed 85 times. He did well with the ladies off screen, but he was usually killed on screen.

In his personal life he had separated from his first wife just a few years into their marriage but continued to support her for 50 years up until her death. When George was a guest on chat shows, he was the only man to stand up when a woman walked on to the stage. Interestingly, or maybe ironically, Raft's last movie appearance in 1980 was *The Man With Bogart's Face*. Perhaps poetically George wound up saving Bogart's life while filming a runaway truck scene which he heroically brought to a stop.

George made some bad career decisions, like trusting his agents' press releases, refusing to work with novice directors, and refusing to play un-redeeming anti-heroes. These, in hindsight, were poor choices. Soon after Warner (Jack Warner was a SOB) annulled his contract. Yet George was still in awe that he was a movie star as he saw himself as an illiterate for most of his life. He would say often, "How did I ever got into pictures in the first place?" He recalled that one day he was sitting in the Brown Derby on Vine Street and a director walked up to him and said he wanted him for a movie.

Because of his association with the criminal element, George got a bad rap after winning \$18,500 in an alleged crooked dice game. Raft claimed he never played with loaded ivories in his life. Later he got caught in tax evasion, was always being questioned about the gangland killing of his friend Bugsy Siegel in 1947, and was banned from England because of his alleged unsavory connections.

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George was always self-effacing when it came to his dancing prowess, but Cagney compared him to Fred Astaire. Some muse that he made the wrong choice settling for gangster parts for most of his career. George

never fit the romantic lead, but off screen he had many affairs with Marlene Dietrich, Betty Grable, Virginia Pine, Carole Lombard, Mae West and Norma Shearer. Married just once, that didn't keep him from being named as a correspondent in many divorce proceedings by angry husbands.

When Raft died of emphysema, little was left of the 10 million he had earned. He said it went to women, gambling, horses, and the rest he said he spent foolishly. George was best known for making other stars a success, but he never kicked

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- First, the contractor will perform a Pre-Painting Inspection.
- One week before painting commences, a Notice to Paint will be taped to your front door and garage doors informing you of the painting start date. The Notice will list the final steps you need to take to prepare your home for painting. It will also list anything you wish not to paint such as: Doors, roof, shutters, back patio, Bottom panels of screen enclosure. (Please: make sure to leave mentioned checklist on your door.)
- Prior to painting your home, the entire exterior of your home will be Pressure Cleaned and prepped for painting.
- After painting, a Final Inspection by representative from Coastal Painting and the HOA will be scheduled.
- If you are not living in your house at the time of painting because you are either out of town or renting your home to a tenant, you must provide a contact information for the person or persons you have designated to carry out the required preparations to the Leisureville office.
- Your Primary responsibility is to prepare your house for painting. To help you do this, we have provided on the following page a Checklist that summarizes your required pre-painting preparation.

PRE – PAINTING CHECKLIST

- Remove all vegetation, including vines that you have planted and that adhere to any surface of your home.
- Pull Back all vegetation that you have planted to at least 10" from any surface.
- Remove all decorative items hung on exterior wall surfaces, including nails and screws.
- Make all repairs necessary to the exterior of your home.
- When you receive your Notice to Paint from the painter, remove all window screens, close and lock all windows and doors, and place a rolled-up towel on each window sill and underneath all doors to prevent water from seeping in.
- Remove all furniture and personal items from your porch, patio and store these items inside your home or garage.
- Park all vehicles in your garage. If this is not possible, remove vehicles from your driveway or in front of your house to prevent overspray.
