On April 13-16, 2023 the senior skydivers once again converged on SkyDive Perris in California.

Their goal - to break a world record and make a Guinness World Record.

This determined group of 101 Skydivers Over Sixty - SOS had their eyes set on making the largest formation of senior skydivers. Last year's attempt, which missed by just one or two jumpers each jump, was still fresh in their heads and they were more than ready to get it done this year.

These skydivers come from all over the world with diverse backgrounds. Men and women both.....the eldest being a 79-year-old woman. Many already hold numerous skydiving records, including our own Glenn Giamatti with 10 records along with some awesome BASE jumps, hot air balloon jumps, and Halo jumps.

This year started out much like last with the first day being weathered out due to high winds. The second day the clouds moved in for most of the day but the group was able to get two jumps in.

The third day was a beautiful weather perfect day. The jumpers were focused and psyched to get

this formation built. The first jump was not bad but the second was a perfect formation of 101 SOSers!! They held the formation for a full seven seconds when only three is required. It was a beautiful sight indeed!!!

After all the celebrations calmed Dan BC, organizer extraordinaire, decided to go for a second world record! This time the group will make the original formation and then the outer jumpers will release grips and move to make a different formation. Six jumpers dropped out leaving 95 SOSers to complete this feat. It was not accomplished in the two remaining jumps on this day.

On day four, again a perfect weather day, the group of 95 focused on the two-point jump. The second jump of the day was picture perfect and the two-point record was made!

This two-year challenge was recorded by PBS and will be made into a documentary called "Life In A Big Way" airing in the next few months. If you see Glenn around Leisureville stop him as he would love to tell you all about it and he might even have photos and videos on his phone

"THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE"

Ed DeFilippis, Jr enlisted, at the age of 18, in the Air Force in 1982 and spent 20 weeks at Lackland base in San Antonio, TX where he trained in Leadership School.

"I enlisted in the Air Force because I wanted to be a fire fighter and wanted the training they offered. However, when I applied it was no longer available, but they offered me law enforcement." He enrolled in ground defense in the police academy in Camp Bulls.

After a short leave home (NJ), he was sent to Albuquerque, NM. "I had to drive there so my father got me a '68 Volkswagen Beetle – no ac and leaked oil! I got as far as Texas and needed gas and oil. I filled up but I had absolutely NO money! The attendant wasn't happy about that. After telling him my sob story of coming across country to serve in the armed forces, I offered him the only thing I had - a suitcase of music tapes."

The worst part of his service was being sent to a remote post in the middle of the desert, sitting alone in a booth at night. The best part, he says, was at Kirtland Air Force Base when President Reagan and then Vice President Bush visited it. At one point, Ed was the cop on base when he was summoned to give CPR to a sergeant who had collapsed. He used his training and brought the man back to life.








After serving 2 years, Airman First Class Ed took a job as a driver for a CEO, moved to Florida and then returned to NJ where he graduated from Fairleigh Dickenson University. He continued his distinguished career in law enforcement for 25 years in NJ and finally moved permanently to Florida. "Service runs in my family," he says. "My sister was in the Navy, my first

son served in the Army and my second son is a Marine."



NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The PBL Board of Directors met on May 16 at 3 pm on Zoom and at Clubhouse 3. All directors were present (Treasurer Hal Eide and Assistant Secretary Jack McQueen on Zoom) along with Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Manager Maya Landa. The Board approved the minutes of the April 18 meeting. The April Treasurer's report is available at the Administrative Office. Manager Nancy Barlow gave the Manager's report. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Director Nancy Price reported that the Recreation Committee has completed painting in Clubhouse 3. There are new tables in Clubhouse 2. The committee had their appreciation luncheon at Bees and Knees. The Jazz band that practices at Clubhouse 1 will perform at the Tree and Menorah lighting event at Clubhouse 3 this December. Dick Duffy will open the Carpentry Shop by appointment for the summer months. Updating Clubhouse 2 is under investigation.

Secretary Bob Wilt reported that member Tom Carey is on leave from the Architectural Committee. Visual inspections of the front of properties were performed.

Vice President Don Ernst reported that Vin DelPrete presented a proposal for a projector to the Technology Committee. The committee is doing additional research on this project. Vantaca is the new system replacing TOPS and works with the Nabr website.

President Jim Czizik reported that the Golf Committee is updating the interior bathrooms at the Golf Shop. The fence at the Golf Shop is under repair.

Jim also reported that the Fining Appeal Committee said all fines on the docket are at least 1 year old. He reviewed the procedure for fining: 3 letters are sent out and after that the Board approves the fining. Then a registered letter is sent. Manager Nancy Barlow reports when repairs are made.

Assistant Jack McQueen brought up Tom Theiring whose article will appear again with pictures in the newspaper.

Treasurer Charlie Cannone reported that the Finance Committee has kept more money in the operating account to cover additional costs like insurance which increased by \$15000.

Dave Hanes from CERT made a presentation. Hurricane season is here. The Red Cross recommends that residents have water and food for 7 days and cash on hand as ATM machines could be down. Any landscape updates should be completed now so debris is gone before hurricane season. The CERT team is canvassing the neighborhood looking at vacant homes to be sure no projectiles are left out. Residents should put the orange magnets on their front doors to show they are present; after the hurricane, the magnets should be removed. CERT teams will check if the magnet is left on; Campbell will reach out to these residents. If a resident is planning to leave, Dave recommends doing so at least 3 days before the hurricane is set to come as 195 gets crowded. Resident Jim Browning recommends that cash be in small bills as merchants might not be able to make change for large bills. President Jim Czizik said the Boynton Beach staff is coming to the Townhall on June 10 to discuss hurricane preparedness.

NEW BUSINESS

Director Charlie Cannone made a motion to approve the March 2023 Financial Statements. The Board approved. Charlie also made a motion to approve Dave Mechanic as a new member of the Finance Committee. The Board approved.

President Jim Czizik made a motion to approve the expenditure of \$6560 by the Golf Committee to remove the carpeting and install new vinyl flooring in the Golf Shop. The Board approved.

Director Nancy Price made a motion to approve the Clubhouse 2 renovation by the Recreation Committee for up to \$60,000. Based on Clubhouse 1 renovation costs, the committee has 2 bids for new ceiling, drywall, and painting, not including permits. Director Cliff Cole said the proposal should go to Finance first. President Jim Czizik said the Board could approve the proposal and then send the quotes to Finance. Nance added to the motion: "subject to confirmation by the Finance Committee." The Board approved.

President Jim Czizik presented 10 Board levied fines for approval. The Board approved.

Director Holly Massman reported about a house in disrepair. President Jim Czizik said the resident is a handicapped veteran who has been removed from the house. There are several benefactors ready to clean out the house; \$95000 is available. The City of Boynton has a controlling interest and is presently looking for an architect to analyze the roof. A project task force is meeting with the city commissioners.

RESIDENTS SPEAK

Jim Browning asked about opening of the Golf Shop door on the patio for the summer months. President Jim Czizik said there are security issues with keeping the door open. The issues were not explained.

Pam Cotant said there are 3 trees leaning on the swales on Leisureville Blvd. President Jim Czizik explained why.

President Jim Czizik reminded residents who are landlords to make sure they are compliant with the City and paying taxes as landlords as the fines are hefty.

BOARD MEETINGS

All Board Meetings at Clubhouse 3 and via Zoom at 3:00 PM Next Board Meeting June 20, 2023

BOARD WORKSHOP - April 4

The Board of Directors and Manager Nancy Barlow met for a workshop on May 2, 2023, in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3pm. Not present was Vice President Don Ernst.

President Jim Czizik started off with an overview for those who have not been to a board workshop. Workshops are designed for board members to address certain issues that have been brought to them. It is a discussion amongst board members; the Board asks attendees to wait until the end when all the items have been discussed and then it will open for questions and concerns.

The first topic on the agenda is golf shop access. Treasurer, Hal Eide has asked to have this brought to the forefront. Hal read from a statement: "Four or five years ago, the practice of walking into the golf building in the offseason and only allowing access for several key holders was altered. The new practice was the incorporation of the swipe card reader and installation of cameras. The Ladies League and Year-round residents should be able to make use of the air-conditioned building with water cooler and lavatories. When a golfer finishes a hot round of golf and needs to sit in a cool environment, it could be a lifesaving event. If a golfer needs a first aid kit, access to the building could be necessary. I am hearing from certain people that that's not the case now. Board members? Any comments?

Nancy Price commented that there have been problems in the past with people getting into the golf shop where there are items that can be stolen or vandalized. People want to get to cool off, get water and use the bathrooms. On the other side. Nancy also feels we need some security.

Nancy Barlow provided an update on the pools. Clubhouse 2 is currently status quo. The attorney had a couple changes to the contract, and she is waiting to get the contract back from Rockstar Pools. As for Clubhouse, there are two large cracks in odd areas. The engineers suggested doing a soil sample to find out what is underneath the pool and what is causing these fractures. These are not normal leak fractures; these are fractures of torquing due to something underneath that is torquing the pool and causing the cracking. Soil samples were taken; the first 5 feet of sand was very compact, which is a perfect scenario. The 2nd 5 feet, because they went 10 feet down, was soft soil which was not keen for the pool. Soil sample results from the lab are not available yet so Nancy cannot move forward on any issues. The pool is safe; it is not losing a tremendous amount of water; it's not going to drop out or anything like that. The engineer voiced his opinion on safety and said the pool is fine right now.

Jim Czizik commented we need to do due diligence because of the sheer dollar amount involved, even for repairs. We must find the underlying cause of why the pool is cracking and then make decisions from there. It is a different scenario than R3 was in 2015.

Nancy Barlow provided an update on camera locations at our critical choke point intersections throughout the community that would have visual access to maybe two or three streets. There is the problem of no power on 18th and 22nd. A meter runs \$3000 or \$4000. if they don't have to go over 100 feet. That's not counting Wi-Fi, fiber, et cetera. We have to get some type of pricing for each location.

Nancy had information from another company called ENVERA, which is a virtual guard that is a talking box that talks back. They have boxes with cameras as well. For example, if at 10:11pm, which has happened here, people jump the fence and use the pool, any type of motion would set the camera off. It would take a picture of the human being and the box would say, "What are you doing here? Get out. The police are being called." They have this feature for inside clubhouses and around pools.

Jim moved on to discuss memorials. We have had an influx of individuals putting plaques up on benches to memorialize friends or individuals that have passed. We have also received complaints from residents to stop this practice. The policy that we have in the Community is that requests for memorials that are not specifically at the golf course are supposed to come up for review and board for approval.

The saunas were discussed next. Nancy, in doing due diligence, measured the saunas because there was some concern from our technical experts about the size, the type of wood, the type of power that would have to go into it, and the cost of commercial grade vs recreational grade that we have right now.

Nancy gave an overview of her findings. We have 6 saunas, 1 male, 1 female in each of the clubhouses. R1 and R2 both have 10'x7' saunas whereas R3 has smaller saunas 7'x7'. They must continuously be repaired. Repairing all 6 is under \$3000 apiece or \$18,000. To go into a commercial size, we must move plumbing. It is a big undertaking. Nancy provided some alternative solutions. There is a new Infrared sauna which is like sunlight; what that does is warm the body the same manner as natural sunlight. Whereas traditional saunas raise the temperature of the air to a very high level within the chamber to warm the body, Infrared saunas heat the body directly. The result is a deeper tissue penetration. It uses large panels that provide you with heating. You can't break them with water. That's the key.

Converting the 10'x7' saunas at R1 and R2, does not change a lot of electrical or anything and would run about \$16,600 which be considerably less than building out the saunas to be able to handle a commercial size unit. Nancy can prepare information for the board. She has the information on what we have now regarding how they work, how water is not to be poured on them and about the electrical boards inside them.

Jim moved on to the fining schedule for minor infractions. Just this past weekend there were several garage sales. Our policy internally is no signs. Residents are expected to come to the office and get a permit for the weekend. Several individuals just said, "Yeah, fine me, I'm not doing it."

Jim said, "I do not know if the character of the community is comprised of this kind of attitude. Or we see this as an archaic rule that we have had in place for a long time." The Board did a survey on this probably a year ago and about 65% of the community said that they did not want to change the rule about signs all over the place and yard sales.

Another issue is individuals that have tree trimming and leave the stuff in the street or all over their property on a weekend, knowing that they may not have bulk pick up until Friday.

Jim also pointed out that parking violations only include courtesy notes on vehicles.

Jim asked how the Board feels about putting together a fining schedule and bringing it out to the community. Cliff commented that if someone gets a letter of violation, someone gets 30 days; it's a very extended process. Is there a way that we can accelerate it.

Nancy Barlow responded we need to follow up with Florida statutes of course, but regarding a fining scheduling, yes, our documents allow it. Nancy already ran it by the attorney; residents do have the right to appeal. By law in Florida statute, if you really want to talk about fining, we can do \$100 a day up to \$1000.

Another suggestion was a \$25 fine. At that time, it is implemented and then we must give them a chance to appear before the Appeal Committee to have their voice. Doing this is simply for people to realize that there's rules to be followed and there is going to be some consequences for breaking the rules.

Landscape Committee News

Your HOA fees include weed spray for grass areas. Call the office for an appointment; now is the time of year to get weeds under control. Your weeds get cut and taken to the neighbor's yards by mowers & blowers. Help stop the spread; call the office 561-732-7474 to be scheduled.

The Landscape Committee provides annual inspections of yards yearly. Please get your yards ready. It will save the volunteers and office a lot of work. These inspections are to help control the cost of landscape and house painting provided by HOA. The LCC inspects properties for the following,

- > Bushes growing over the windows.
- > Bushes above the railing at the front porch
- > Weeds overgrown in plants and flowerbeds.
- > Too many potted plants only 10 per property, max 5 per side of house.
- > Trees only 2 per front and back, none on sides of home unless corner lot.
- > Plantings at lamp post must be kept 1 foot below light and no larger than 2' in diameter.
- > Patio privacy hedges are allowed in rear of home around patio area 5-6' height.
- > Fruit trees (2) are allowed in rear of home only.
- > Norfolk Island Pine Trees (Christmas tree) CAN NOT be planted.
- > Banana Trees are not permitted. Existing bananas limited to 5 trunks.
- Coconut Trees are not permitted. Existing trees are required to have all coconuts removed in June due to hurricane season.

Landscape Policies also follow city and state Guidelines for Landscape regulations. They change due to environmental impacts. To learn more, a good resource for South Florida plants is www.sfwmd.gov; look for TAB Waterwise. A booklet is available for review. Contact the LCC. Plants that are not native to the area are considered exotic or invasive plants. A list can be found at www. FLEPPC.org and there is a partial list in the Waterwise booklet as well. Unfortunately, some of the plants on the list are still sold in store locally. They maybe on a watch list and not yet banned for local use.

We welcome you join the Landscape committee. We meet the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month in the Administration conference room 3:30. The LCC sponsors the **Green Thumb Award** to properties each month in the newspaper and with a yard sign, You can send in nominations to **PBLgreenthumb@gmail.com**. Golden Age Of Hollywood - Dick Powell



Our June star Richard Ewing Powell was born November 14, 1904 to Ewing and Sallie Powell in Mountain View, Arkansas. Ewing was the head of International Harvester Company, a position that kept him moving around the state. Eventually the family moved to Little Rock. Ewing passed on his hard work ethic to his three children while Sallie instilled the love of music in her children. She played the piano and

taught both Dick and his brother Howard who excelled on the keyboard whereas Richard becoming frustrated as he lagged behind his brother picked up the clarinet, trumpet and saxophone. All three served him well later in life. However, Dick discovered his greatest musical instrument was his voice and the station master in Berryville began paying him 5 cents to sing a chorus of "Casey Jones." Before long, their father encouraged both boys to sing for a profit and they did in the local Synagogue, Episcopal and Methodist Church and Scottish Rite Consistory.

Finishing high school Dick enrolled in Little Rock College and in his spare time started the Peter Pan Dance Band which became very popular. During this time, he met his first wife Mildred Maund whose family was quite wealthy, and she charmed Dick into a secret marriage. Problems would soon arise after Dick quit school and joined another dance band. Mildred expecting a traditional marriage hated show business but soon realized that Dick was not going to turn his back on his career.

When Dick got a job as a lead vocalist at the Kentucky Hotel in Louisville, he was heard by the local radio station and his following began to grow. Dick didn't just sing, he talked to his audience which deepened their connection with him, and his reputation grew. So much so that Charlie Davis who was conducting at the Ohio Theater brought him on but also required him to play the banjo which he quickly learned so he could accept the offer. His new vocation allowed him to meet the likes of Jean Harlow, Joe E. Brown and Ginger Rodgers. Quickly Dick had his own band, and a radio show called the Pow Wow Club which found him receiving baskets of fan mail.

Warner Brothers offered him a contract as they were planning a movie called 'The Crooner' which he accepted even though the compensation was considerably less than he was already making with the band and radio. When Dick had his screen test, they were so impressed they cast him in 'Blessed Event' instead and his box office exploded. When he was cast in '42ndStreet' which was a revolutionary for the genre he made his first teaming with Ruby Keeler. Their chemistry was electric, and they starred together in a series of Busby Berkeley musicals starting with 'Gold Diggers Of 1933', 'Footlight Parade', 'Dames', 'Flirtation Walk', 'Shipmates Forever' and 'Colleen'. Their fame was cemented.

Warner tended to stick with the team approach and Dick appeared in films with the likes of Pat O'Brien, Ginger Rogers, Guy Kibbee, Ann Dvorak Hugh Herbert, Marion Davies and Joan Blondell. The last two women would play significant parts in Dick's life. Marion Davies a mistress of business tycoon William Randolph Hearst considered herself in an open relationship. Marion knew that the Hearst affair would lead nowhere and so her liaison with Dick seemed so natural. Joan Blondell in the middle of a divorce seemed the more practical choice for Dick and they married September 19, 1936. Maybe a harbinger of what was to be Dick became sick on his honeymoon and their consummation was interrupted. Warner Brothers, always the opportunists, quickly cast the two in 'Stage Struck' and 'Gold Diggers of 1937'. However, audiences were tired of musicals and those formulaic plots.

Joan and Dick seemed to have the ideal marriage and Dick adopted her son Norman from her previous marriage and before long daughter Ellen arrived. Dick was a shrewd investor, especially in real estate, and with his profits he bought his first yacht as he had an affection for the sea and took his family out as often as time would allow. As Dick's popularity began to wane at the box office, he had to accept lesser roles like Abbott and Costello In the Navy. Now at third billing he knew he'd have to carve out a new genre if he were to remain viable as a star. His inspiration came from the script he saw from RKO 'Double Indemnity' starring Stanwyck and MacMurray. It was a part he begged for, but the studio laughed him off thinking how a crooner could be a film noir star. When RKO bought the rights to the book Farewell My Lovely by Raymond Chandler director William Dmytryk pleaded with the studio heads to have Dick in the lead even though they wanted him to sing. The gamble was a success, and the movie public began to rave about the new Dick Powell. The studio quickly changed the title to 'Murder My Sweet' fearing the audiences might think it was another musical.

During this time of transition, the Powell-Blondell union began to crumble as Joan began seeing Mike Todd (another disaster for Joan) and Dick began seeing June Allyson. Divorce number 2, for both ensued. June began to make demands for marriage and at first Dick balked but finally agreed and they were married August 19, 1945. At first it seemed to have been determined that June could not bear children and so they adopted a girl named Pamela and when the couple thought their daughter needed a companion, they were going to adopt another child when June became pregnant and their son Richard Jr. was born.

Dick was so busy and spent little time at home which he tried to make up for by buying the kids lavish gifts. By this time June's career began to take off under the watchful eye of Dick. Spending time at RKO had him befriend Howard Hughes and the reclusive billionaire allowed Dick to direct the film 'Split Second' and more were to follow. This directorial debut would later spawn directorial efforts on the small screen. Dick loved the new transition behind the camera and films like 'The Conqueror' starring John Wayne and Susan Hayward which was an odd pairing and although the film was panned the site, the location, and the red sands of Utah became legendary.

With the help of Charles Boyer and David Niven, Dick began The Four-Star Playhouse which featured a different star every week. This allowed Powell to see and help cast up and coming actors including a young writer Aaron Spelling. With the success of Four-Star Dick produced the Zane Grey Theater, The Dick Powell Show and The Dupont Show starring wife June Allyson.

The workaholic Dick had him neglecting June and after she costarred

with Alan Ladd in The McConnell Story June filed for divorce. Dick undaunted remained in the house convinced she still loved him, and he was right, they never divorced. All seemed idyllic but after a family boat trip, it was revealed Dick had throat cancer and despite his claims that he would beat it Dick died after several months on January 2,

His tragic death at 58 left the industry reeling as it did his wife June. Dick's full body of work, although a great compendium, would no doubt have been greater had he lived longer.


My first thought was that maybe some teenagers were feeling prankish, but it might just be some shoppers not wanting to trek back to the store with an empty cart and






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
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GOLF CORNER



What the Painting Contractor will do:

- First, the contractor will perform a Pre-Painting Inspection.
- One week before painting commences, a Notice to Paint will be taped to your front door and garage doors informing you of the painting start date. The Notice will list the final steps you need to take to prepare your home for painting. It will also list anything you wish not to paint such as: Doors, roof, shutters, back patio, Bottom panels of screen enclosure. (Please: make sure to leave mentioned checklist on your door.)
- Prior to painting your home, the entire exterior of your home will be Pressure Cleaned and prepped for painting.
- After painting, a Final Inspection by representative from Coastal Painting and the HOA will be scheduled.
- If you are not living in your house at the time of painting because you
 are either out of town or renting your home to a tenant, you must provide
 a contact information for the person or persons you have designated to
 carry out the required preparations to the Leisureville office.
- Your Primary responsibility is to prepare your house for painting. To help you do this, we have provided on the following page a Checklist that summarizes your required pre-painting preparation.



PRE - PAINTING CHECKLIST

- Remove all vegetation, including vines that you have planted and that adhere to any surface of your home.
- Pull Back all vegetation that you have planted to at least 10" from any surface.
- Remove all decorative items hung on exterior wall surfaces, including nails and screws.
- Make all repairs necessary to the exterior of your home.
- When you receive your Notice to Paint from the painter, remove all window screens, close and lock all windows and doors, and place a rolled-up towel on each window sill and underneath all doors to prevent water from seeping in.
- Remove all furniture and personal items from your porch, patio and store these items inside your home or garage.
- Park all vehicles in your garage. If this is not possible, remove vehicles from your driveway or in front of your house to prevent over-spray.



A Message From Your CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) Palm Beach Leisureville

It's that time when folks leave and head north! Please read the following:

Should our area experience a hurricane or any other type of disaster, there are trained folks in our community who work under the Boynton Beach Fire Department.

It is never too early to prepare the exterior of your home for tropical storms or hurricanes. We are quickly approaching the beginning of the hurricane season. Our team is here to not only access and assist if necessary, but also to ensure our community is ready should we encounter any type of major storm.

All residents who live here full time or expect to be here should have the orange magnet. If not, they are available at the Leisureville office. If we have been issued a Hurricane Warning and you are planning on staying in your home, place the magnet on your front door. CERT members will be riding around prior to the storm and documenting all residents who have remained. After the storm has passed remove the magnet as soon as it is safe to go outside. Our team members will be driving around, not only to check for magnets but to assess possible damage. If you have left your magnet on the door, they will attempt to reach you. If they do not get an answer, they will attempt to enter the house as this is an indication you may have a physical problem.

Now is the time to prepare your property. If you are leaving for the season, NOTHING is to remain outside your home. Patio furniture, all potted plants, decorative items, roof tiles, bags of dirt, bikes, grills, trash and recycle bins, etc. must be stored inside your home or garage. Many of these items are not supposed to be on the exterior of your property at any time. If you have a carport, you need to remove any items that are light enough to be picked up by the wind. The only item that is acceptable is your car. If you have a neighbor or property manager looking after your home, please alert them in case you forget any items.

All trees should be trimmed and thinned out for the hurricane season. All property debris and items from your home should be put in the trash now. This is the time to clean out and trim back.

In the past, our members drove around for two days advising your neighbors, and possibly you, of items that become dangerous during a storm. This is not the responsibility of CERT. If you wait until the last minute to cut your trees, or rid your house and yard of debris or any other type of clean-out/clean-up, this creates a problem. Many residents put out large pieces of trash and clippings from trees and bushes when they hear a storm is coming. If the city has already issued an advisory they may not be collecting. These items become projectiles in a storm.

We hear this is the time to gather your supplies, this is the time to prepare your home and yard. All Leisureville volunteer members of CERT live in our community, have city issued badges and most likely will have large magnets on their vehicles identifying themselves as CERT members. They may also have vests on with the words CERT. We communicate with each other via radios. We do not help prepare your home or yard. We are there to assist should there be an emergency and the fire department and/or police are not able to gain access to our community.

Everyone needs to prepare for emergency situations, but shopping for supplies can be expensive and strenuous. Shopping for items a little at a time before an event, can reduce the stress of recovery by avoiding long lines and empty shelves.

3/4 cup granulated sugar

1/2 cup unsalted butter, softened

1 large egg

2 cups flour

2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

3/4 cup milk

1 tsp.vanilla

2 cups fresh blueberries

TOPPING

1/2 firmly packed brown sugar

1/2 cup flour

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 cup butter


1/2 tsp. vanilla

Combine brown sugar, flour salt, vanilla; cut in butter with a fork until mixture is crumbly.

CAKE

Beat sugar and butter at medium speed with an electric mixer until fluffy; add egg beating until blended. Combine flour, baking powder and salt in a separate bowl; add to butter mixture alternating with milk, beginning and ending with flour mixture.. Beat at low speed just until blended after each addition. Stir in vanilla and fold in blueberries. Pour batter into a greased 9 inch pan or a greased 10" spring form pan. Sprinkle topping on cake and bake at 375 degree oven for 45 minutes or until a pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan. Serve with whipped cream if desired.

This is how the MSFH Program works. In a nutshell

- Florida homeowner applies for a FREE wind mitigation inspection at www.MySafeFLHome.com
- 2. Homeowner application is approved, and Inspection company reaches out to schedule inspection.
- Inspection company provides homeowner with a detailed report identifying their home's strengths and weaknesses against storm wind, and identifies areas for retrofit upgrades.
- Homeowner decides their next steps, if any.
- 5. Qualified homeowners apply for a MSFH Grant from the Program to help reduce the cost of their wind upgrade improvements.
- 6. Homeowner is approved for a grant and supplied with a list of Program approved contractors from whom to get bids for the construction work identified in their report and covered by the MSFH program bids.
- Homeowner selects contractor and awards the MSFH Upgrade project.
- Contractor completes work which is re-inspected and then approved for payment.
- 9. \$5,000 Low Income grant money go directly to the contractor for the completed and approved construction work. This is not a reimbursement grant.
- 10. \$10,000 grants payments go to the homeowners only after contractor is paid and home is re-inspected and approved. This is a re-imbursement grant. Homeowner must spend \$5,000 to get the full \$10,000 reimbursement.
- Work must be permitted and meet Florida building codes.
