NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The PBL Board of Directors met on August 15 at 3 PM in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom. All except Director Nancy Price were present; Vice President Don Ernst, Treasurer Hal Eide, and Assistant Secretary Jack McQueen were on Zoom. Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Maya Landa were present. Minutes from the July,2023 minutes were approved. The July Financials are available in the Administration Office. Manager Nancy Barlow gave the Manager's Report.

Secretary Bob Wilt reported that the Architectural Committee approved 26 applications.

NEW BUSINESS

Director Charles Cannone made a motion to approve the June 2023 Financials. The Board approved.

Director Cliff Cole made a motion to approve the lightning rods for Clubhouse 2 at a cost of \$22100. Finance Chairperson Steve Schone stated that we will start with Clubhouse 2 to see what happens. If successful, then we will do Clubhouse 3 and 1. The Board approved.

Vice President Don Ernst made a motion to approve Lynn Kordower as Assistant Editor of the newspaper and as a Technology Committee voting member. The Board approved.

Director Cliff Cole presented a motion from Director Nancy Price concerning the Resale/Rental policies. The motion eliminates the \$100 yearly fee for using the golf course. President Jim Czizik explained that the renter already has an access card, so it eliminates the need for a second card; the owner has already forfeited the access to the renter. The Board approved this motion and the similar change in the general policy.

President Jim Czizik presented 10 properties for Board levied fines. The Board approved and these properties' fines will be given to the Fining Appeals Committees in October.

Director Holly Massman reminded the community about the Summer Dance on August 20.

OLD BUSINESS

Secretary Bob Wilt said that the issue of adverse possession is on hold since the lawyer had back surgery. President Jim Czizik said ownership of the Clubhouse 1 pool is critical; we need to find out if the owners are responsible for the cost of a new pool.

RESIDENTS SPEAK

Jim Browning praised Campbell's new software. Jim called to speak to the new sprinkler hotline over the weekend. On Monday, Jim received an email that his message was received. On Tuesday, his sprinkler was fixed, and a Campbell employee knocked on his door to inform him of the completed job.

Paula Curran asked for clarification about the fee renter's pay, \$100 application fee. No further fees will be paid upon renewal of the lease.

President Jim Czizik said the Board is putting in work orders for repairing the sidewalks on SW 18th Street. He also reported that the COP vehicle has had flat tires from nails. He asked residents to call the office if they see someone taking apart appliances or furniture and leaving the screws and nails in the street.

renting to, and it does not exclude golf. If everyone agrees at the next board meeting, we will have a motion specifically to address and eliminate this from the policies.

Jim moved on to provide pool updates. At R2 the pool company had gone back and drained the pool and corrected some minor imperfections. They did another acid wash, filled the pool up and it was opened. The City of Boynton Beach and the Health Department approved it. The next thing that's going to happen is on one side of the pool there are going to be floating ropes making 2 lanes, so people can swim laps at their leisure. We're going to put them in the morning and evening. The ropes will be inside the pool just above the waterline; there'll be a hook and the ropes will have bobbins on them. If we don't have people hang on the ropes, they should last.

Jim continued with the next agenda item, background checks. We are talking about possibly having applications that renters and potential homeowners fill out to do background checks. This would be outsourced to a corporation. It eliminates a lot of the concerns that we have had about identity theft. No one in Campbell or the Leisureville will have anybody's personal information. The company would work with the potential applicant and provide them with a report that they turn in with their application. It would have their financial considerations; they would be vetted for their addresses and background. Over the next couple of weeks, Nancy Barlow is going to be sharing information with some of the board members to see this is a viable thing that we should do. It would then be brought up at the next board meeting for Community consideration and see if everybody agrees. Currently, there are no background checks being done. We have the allowance to do background checks and we have not been doing it. This needs to be done professionally. Nancy Barlow has another meeting set, bringing in finance board members to go over this one last time and then propose it to the Community.

The next thing is saunas. Currently we have a men's sauna active in R1. We have one sauna that is up and running right now in R2. We are trying to get the modern sauna that was proposed. We had a lot of problems getting people to bid on it because of the different types of heat shields that they use and the sizes and the numbers to try to get a standardized heat index. Before the next board meeting, we would like to propose something for R3.

Next item is Town Halls. We had a town hall scheduled for August the 10th that was cancelled. In its place Palm Beach County and CERT hosted a hurricane preparedness seminar. A mini-Town Hall meeting and CERT presentation took place on Tuesday the 8th. Wawa and Xfinity served lunch.

There's an update for the community. The Bocce courts are a little bit uneven. We wanted to do some repairs on it. We have several individuals in our community that believe that the repairs can be done for the winter season. We are in the process right now of working with a small group of individuals involved with the Bocce league.

The last thing is proxies. This has been a nightmare topic for the community. Six months from now, we're going to have elections again. The proxy situation that we have has not changed; there has been some work done with prior lawyers back in 2015 and 2016 to eliminate the need for Quorums completely. There has been an exhaustive amount of legal effort put into designing how to do it and it never went anywhere. It is unknown what our ultimate solution is going to be. An election sheet and a proxy sheet as two separate sheets had everybody confused and frustrated. Proxies, because of the nature of what it is, and it's in our founding documents, must go to the community. 75% of the community need to participate. If it's something that folks think is going to happen in November and December, it's not. If we're going to do something as a unified body, we need to start doing it soon.

Jim also said that the Board is trying to find funds to replace the loss of rental fees for the Golf Committee.

Jim said Director Nancy Price has done extensive investigation concerning pool 1 problems. The project will take 1 year. The Board is trying to find out about the legal obligation of the owner.

BOARD WORKSHOP – August 1

The Board of Directors met for a workshop on August 1, 2023, in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3pm. Hal Eide was on zoom, manager Nancy Barlow was excused, all other members were present.

President Jim Czizik started off with the first agenda item, golf shop fees. Nancy Price reported that under resale and rental policy there is a \$100 golf administration fee per golfer per lease if the renter chooses to play golf. We can amend this policy to eliminate it altogether going forward.

Jim Czizik added that the documents state a homeowner who rents out their home and forfeits all personal use of all recreational facilities, and that those are titled over to the individual they're (continued on page 8)

Dorothy Kilgallen: "The most powerful female journalist in the Country."

Dorothy Kilgallen was born July 3, 1913, in Chicago, Illinois. Sired by James Kilgallen a popular newspaperman with the Hearst Corporation. She followed her father and established her own reputation as a crime

reporter. The New York Post said: "Wherever Dorothy goes fame precedes her, envy follows her, and a crowd looks on. She is one of the communication marvels of the age." Quite an introduction to a longtime panelist on the Emmy nominated hit show, *What's My Line* hosted by John Charles Daly where she sat for sixteen seasons.

In 1938 the New York Journal American has Dorothy covering Broadway with her own column that started locally but soon became Nationwide. It was titled *The Voice of Broadway*.

In 1940 Dorothy married Richard Kolmar and she would have three children with him and stayed married until her death November 7, 1965. The two broke into radio with their own show called *Breakfast with Dorothy and Dick*. They were dubbed Mr. and Mrs. Radio.

In 1950 she began her long stint as part of the four-member panel on *What's My Line* but continued with her newspaper column that included more serious subjects including her natural talent for covering crime. In 1954 she covered the Sam Shepherd murder case in Cleveland. Dorothy was convinced the good doctor was not guilty of stabbing his wife and although the jury disagreed and sentenced Dr. Shepherd to jail for 12 years. Dorothy, relentless in her belief he was innocent, was rewarded when Sam Shepherd was exonerated. As she continued to cover high profile cases like the Lenny Bruce 1st Amendment and the Lindbergh kidnapping cases, the New York Post called her the most powerful female voice in America.

Dorothy seemed to have it all. Status, wealth, a family, a burgeoning career, but as is life her marriage to Dick began to crumble. Dick had a roving eye and drank to excess but the couple never divorced. Her hairdresser, Marc Sinclaire asked her why and she told him she just couldn't because Dick was too kind to her, as Dick performed as the father to her youngest child who was fathered by singer Johnny Ray.

Here's a backstory on Johnny Ray and Dorothy. Johnny Ray who was openly homosexual while a guest panelist on *What's My Line* struck up an intense relationship with Dorothy and she sired a child with him. Her husband Dick nonetheless seemed to forgive her infidelity and took her youngest son as his own.

In the early 60's Dorothy continued with her rock-solid newspaper career meeting and writing about all the celebrities that came to town like *The Beatles* and *Marilyn Monroe*. She was invited to the White House and met then President John F. Kennedy and when he was assassinated was devastated. When she covered the story of Jack Rubinstein aka Ruby her instincts told her something was awry. How could a sleazy owner of a strip club work his way into Police Headquarters where the security was supposedly airtight. She was not interested in Lee Harvey Oswald, her focus remained on Ruby. During Ruby's trial after most of the attendees had left, she leaned over to Jack and had a conversation with him, maybe because of that confab ,Dorothy was convinced the assassination of JFK was not an open and shut case. When she died all her notes and files mysteriously disappeared.

New Orleans. She was certain organized crime had serious motive for killing Jack Kennedy which would leave RFK powerless, their ultimate objective. It is alleged she connected Lee Harvey Oswald, Jack Ruby and Carlos Marcello who was head of the New Orleans crime family from 1947-1983. Marcello, when testifying, had been deported but years later he remained in the States because he filed countless motions to stay deportation. RFK had Marcello deported to Guatemala but sneaked back to the U.S. three months later. Marcello seethed and it slipped from his mouth that he had murder on his mind.

Back to Dorothy. In 1965 Dorothy began an affair with a young journalist from Ohio named Ron Pataky. He latched on to her and the two had a torrid love affair. During this time, she began to become very afraid and bought a gun. She saw a picture of her son Kerry running across an open area in Central Park in the newspaper; she thought he was going to be kidnapped.

On the eve of her death November 7, 1965, Dorothy appeared on a live telecast of *What's My Line* and after the show told Sinclair to come to her home at 9 am that next morning. He found her in Richard's bed (the one she didn't sleep in), and she was fully dressed, sitting up with the air conditioner on (It was November.) makeup and false eyelashes, hairpiece on and an open book overturned with no glasses nearby. Her close friend and hairdresser said it looked like a staged death. Sinclair said she was dressed peculiarly as if she was going out. He speculated that it was to keep her body at a different temperature. When Sinclair left, he found it strange that a police car was parked outside her home before anyone knew she was dead. Her death was quickly ruled an overdose. No investigation as the ME's office was controlled by the Mafia. Sinclair thought her love interest Pataky was the 'snitch.' It was thought he was an operative of the FBI.

After her death the FBI swooped into her townhouse and collected all her documents and files. Maybe one day hopefully in our lifetime we will find out what was contained therein. It is my opinion that because there are so many individuals still alive these JFK files will remain sealed until that segment of the population is dead and buried.

Dorothy was often compared to Walter Winchell whom she eventually eclipsed during the 50's and she never resorted to the mean-spirited approach that Walter employed to make him a journalistic presence. As I mention Winchell you may recall was the narrator on *The Untouchables* which ran for four seasons 1959-63 starring Robert Stack.

P.S.

It has been nigh on 8 years that I have written this column and it is only of late that you the readers have approached me about my vignettes, which I appreciate very much. If you have any comments, I would love to hear from you. My email is Jackbriant@ mac.com. Marlene, one of our residents, when I was speaking with her one day in the R-3 pool, suggested I place my email here.



When her paper published the story "*What Ruby Told Warren In Jail*" all hell broke loose for her. After that the FBI stalked her, tapped her phones, and undertook an investigation to try to find out how Dorothy obtained her information. She said she would die before she disclosed that information. She later wrote disparaging the Bureau saying that "the FBI might have been more profitably employed in probing the facts of the case rather than how I got them, which seems a waste of time to me."

When the Warren report was published, she told her closest friends that her book that she was working on would prove who killed JFK. She had dug up something about the assassination that somebody didn't want her to know. She was convinced she might be murdered because of what she knew. Her investigation into the mob connection deepened when she went to meet a secret informant in Thank you, Marlene.

Study questions claims of alcohol benefits

The good news is a small quantity of alcohol here and there, more than likely, will not kill you, but it will not help you live longer either.

A study published in the journal, JAMA Network Open, researchers tried to make sense of years of conflicting evidence on alcohol's effect on health. Some research suggested that drinking alcohol improves life expectancy. Yet other studies had demonstrated poorer health outcomes at any level of drinking.

The researchers analyzed 105 studies on the effect of alcohol in nearly 5 million people and found that no amount of alcohol consumption led to a longer life than among people who never drank. People who drank 45 grams of alcohol or more a day, about (as much as 3 glasses of wine) increased their risk of dying sooner by as much as a third. Among women, anything more than 25 grams of alcohol increased their risk of dying sooner.

"Alcohol is linked to more than 200 diseases. You would be bored by the time I finished naming them all," said Jurgen Rehm, senior scientist at Canada's Center for Addiction and Mental Health, who wasn't involved in the study.

The findings suggest that the average man can drink up to about 3 drinks a day and expect to live as long as non-drinkers. Woman may want to stop at about two drinks, the research suggested.

The new study joins a body of evidence that alcohol does more harm than good.

Rates of deaths involving alcohol in the U.S. rose a record 25% during the pandemic in 2020, plus an additional 10% in 2021, according to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism. Per capita alcohol consumption measured as gallons of pure alcohol per person, rose 2.9% in 2020, which was the largest increase in more than 50 years.

Amanda Berger, a vice president at the Distilled Spirits Council of the U.S., a trade association, said alcohol is a life-style choice involving risks and benefits. "Alcohol can also be a part of a balanced diet for most adults," she added.

Tim Stockwell, director of the Canada Institute for Substance Use Research and an author of a recent study, said many studies demonstrating health benefits from alcohol consumption were poorly conducted.

Several studies counted people who had stopped drinking after years of heavy consumption with people who had never had a sip of alcohol. Comparing people who had stopped drinking because of health concerns with moderate drinkers look healthier. Dr. Stockwell called it the "sick quitter effect."

Some studies didn't account for occasional drinkers who have outgrown the party life, another factor that would make heavier drinkers, who tend to be younger and have fewer chronic health problems, look healthier.

Genes that contribute to an inability to metabolize alcohol are also related to lower cardiovascular risk, he said. Some people with genes that are associated with flushing red when they drink are at a higher risk of some cancers. Genetics research shows that people with a higher tolerance are also at a higher risk for alcohol dependence and cardiovascular disease.

Landscape Committee News

Your HOA fees include weed spray for grass areas. Call the office for an appointment; now is the time of year to get weeds under control. Your weeds get cut and taken to the neighbor's yards by mowers & blowers. Help stop the spread; call the office 561-732-7474 to be scheduled.

The Landscape Committee provides annual inspections of yards yearly. Please get your yards ready. It will save the volunteers and office a lot of work. These inspections are to help control the cost of landscape and house painting provided by HOA. The LCC inspects properties for the following,

- > Bushes growing over the windows.
- > Bushes above the railing at the front porch
- > Weeds overgrown in plants and flowerbeds.
- > Too many potted plants only 10 per property, max 5 per side of house.
- > Trees only 2 per front and back, none on sides of home unless corner lot.
- > Plantings at lamp post must be kept 1 foot below light and no larger than 2' in diameter.
- > Patio privacy hedges are allowed in rear of home around patio area 5-6' height.
- > Fruit trees (2) are allowed in rear of home only.
- > Norfolk Island Pine Trees (Christmas tree) CAN NOT be planted.
- > Banana Trees are not permitted. Existing bananas limited to 5 trunks.
- > Coconut Trees are not permitted. Existing trees are required to have all coconuts removed in June due to hurricane season.

Landscape Policies also follow city and state Guidelines for Landscape regulations. They change due to environmental impacts. To learn more, a good resource for South Florida plants is www.sfwmd.gov; look for TAB Waterwise. A booklet is available for review. Contact the LCC. Plants that are not native to the area are considered exotic or invasive plants. A list can be found at www. FLEPPC.org and there is a partial list in the Waterwise booklet as well. Unfortunately, some of the plants on the list are still sold in store locally. They maybe on a watch list and not yet banned for local use.



A Message From Your CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) Palm Beach Leisureville

It's that time when folks leave and head north! Please read the following:

Should our area experience a hurricane or any other type of disaster, there are trained folks in our community who work under the Boynton Beach Fire Department.

It is never too early to prepare the exterior of your home for tropical storms or hurricanes. We are quickly approaching the beginning of the hurricane season. Our team is here to not only access and assist if necessary, but also to ensure our community is ready should we encounter any type of major storm.

All residents who live here full time or expect to be here should have the orange magnet. If not, they are available at the Leisureville office. If we have been issued a Hurricane Warning and you are planning on staying in your home, place the magnet on your front door. CERT members will be riding around prior to the storm and documenting all residents who have remained. After the storm has passed remove the magnet as soon as it is safe to go outside. Our team members will be driving around, not only to check for magnets but to assess possible damage. If you have left your magnet on the door, they will attempt to reach you. If they do not get an answer, they will attempt to enter the house as this is an indication you may have a physical problem.

Now is the time to prepare your property. If you are leaving for the season, NOTHING is to remain outside your home. Patio furniture, all potted plants, decorative items, roof tiles, bags of dirt, bikes, grills, trash and recycle bins, etc. must be stored inside your home or garage. Many of these items are not supposed to be on the exterior of your property at any time. If you have a carport, you need to remove any items that are light enough to be picked up by the wind. The only item that is acceptable is your car. If you have a neighbor or property manager looking after your home, please alert them in case you forget any items.

All trees should be trimmed and thinned out for the hurricane season. All property debris and items from your home should be put in the trash now. This is the time to clean out and trim back.

In the past, our members drove around for two days advising your neighbors, and possibly you, of items that become dangerous during a storm. This is not the responsibility of CERT. If you wait until the last minute to cut your trees, or rid your house and yard of debris or any other type of clean-out/clean-up, this creates a problem. Many residents put out large pieces of trash and clippings from trees and bushes when they hear a storm is coming. If the city has already issued an advisory they may not be collecting. These items become projectiles in a storm.



What the Painting Contractor will do:

- First, the contractor will perform a Pre-Painting Inspection.
- One week before painting commences, a Notice to Paint will be taped to your front door and garage doors informing you of the painting start date. The Notice will list the final steps you need to take to prepare your home for painting. It will also list anything you wish not to paint such as: Doors, roof, shutters, back patio, Bottom panels of screen enclosure. (Please: make sure to leave mentioned checklist on your door.)
- Prior to painting your home, the entire exterior of your home will be Pressure Cleaned and prepped for painting.
- After painting, a Final Inspection by representative from Coastal Painting and the HOA will be scheduled.
- If you are not living in your house at the time of painting because you are either out of town or renting your home to a tenant, you must provide a contact information for the person or persons you have designated to carry out the required preparations to the Leisureville office.
- Your Primary responsibility is to prepare your house for painting. To help you do this, we have provided on the following page a Checklist that summarizes your required pre-painting preparation.

PRE – PAINTING CHECKLIST

- Remove all vegetation, including vines that you have planted and that adhere to any surface of your home.
- Pull Back all vegetation that you have planted to at least 10" from any surface.
- · Remove all decorative items hung on exterior wall surfaces,






Spaghetti with Pancetta And Ricotta

Kosher salt

- 12 ounces of spaghetti
- 2 tab. extra virgin olive oil
- 4 ounces of diced pancetta
- 1 tea. ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup of whole milk ricotta cheese
- 1/4 cup grated pecorino or parmesan cheese

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add the spaghetti and cook as label directs for al dente. Reserve 1 1/4 cups of cooking water and then drain. Meanwhile combine the olive oil and pancetta in a large pot over medium high heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, until pancetta is golden brown and crisp, 3 to 5 minutes. Stir in 1/2 teas of pepper, then add 3/4 cup of cooking water and the spaghetti, tossing till combined. Stir in ricotta and 2 tab. cheese, tossing constantly to evenly coat. Add more cooking water if sauce is too thick or dry. Season with salt. Sprinkle with remaining cheese and serve. Serves 4 people.

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

- 1. Florida homeowner applies for a FREE wind mitigation inspection at www.MySafeFLHome.com
- Homeowner application is approved, and Inspection company reaches out to schedule inspection.
- 3. Inspection company provides homeowner with a detailed report identifying their home's strengths and weaknesses against storm wind, and identifies areas for retrofit upgrades.
- 4. Homeowner decides their next steps, if any.
- Qualified homeowners apply for a MSFH Grant from the Program to help reduce the cost of their wind upgrade improvements.
- Homeowner is approved for a grant and supplied with a list of Program approved contractors from whom to get bids for the construction work identified in their report and covered by the MSFH program bids.
- 7. Homeowner selects contractor and awards the MSFH Upgrade project.
- 8. Contractor completes work which is re-inspected and then approved for payment.
- \$5,000 Low Income grant money go directly to the contractor for the completed and approved construction work. This is not a reimbursement grant.
