This month's spotlight is on a man who not only served in the Army but has dedicated his career to helping those others who have served. Meet Major Raul Diaz, Ph.D. U.S. Army Retired 2015.



He received his degree in psychology at Bowling Green State University in Ohio. Later he left private practice and was recruited in South Florida by direct commission. "I saw a need for my psychological background in the service." Raul joined the 187th Battalion Alpha Company's medical division.



Raul was then deployed to Iraq in 2006 and served in Baghdad and Afghanistan during his 10-year tenure. While stationed in the desert he lived in 'older' tents with very little protection from the elements. "It was austere. My stay there made me appreciate what we had at home."


When asked what the best part of his service was, he immediately responded, "The comradery! That was thicker than blood", he expounded. He and his comrades are still in touch with each other, attending reunions, the most recent of which was in the California Red Woods.

One of his worst memories was in Baghdad when Army Nurse Maria Ortiz was fatally wounded. "I was called upon to help with the grieving of both her family, but also her team members. Maria was the first nurse to be killed in service since Viet Nam. It was tough."

Major Raul now serves at Director of the Palm Beach Veterans Center in Greenacres. "Remember, these veterans learned to have normal reactions to abnormal situations, one of which is constantly being vigilant and alert." Quick with a smile and handshake, Raul says he's looking forward to his retirement from the Vet Center next February. And we wish him well.

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NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The PBL Board of Directors met on September 19 in Clubhouse 3 at 3 PM and on Zoom. All members were in attendance; Treasurer Hal Eide and Assistant Secretary Jack McQueen were on Zoom. Also in attendance were Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Manager Maye Landa. The Board approved the minutes from August 15. The August Treasurer report is available in the office. Manager Nancy Barlow gave the Manager's report.

Secretary Bob Wilt reported that the ACC reviewed 36 applications.

NEW BUSINESS

Director Charlie Cannone's motion to approve the Financial Statements was approved.

Secretary Bob Wilt made a motion to change ACC code 101.24 concerning walkways. It was amended to state that the walkways must be of the same material as the driveway and not an extension of the driveway. The Board approved.

Director Charlie Cannone made a motion to contract Safe Seawalls to replace the seawalls on the golf course for a cost not to exceed 1.5 million. President Jim Czizik said he and Secretary Bob Wilt are meeting with the attorney to clarify if we must maintain the golf course during the legal process. Manager Nancy Barlow said we are making 1 bulk order for the materials for the seawalls; she is waiting to determine the legitimate ownership of the golf course and pool. Director Cliff Cole asked that the 1.5 million be explained since the vendor quote is lower. Charlie said the survey and sod permits are not included. Cliff suggested that we use corrugated vinyl over aluminum; he said the vinyl looks better although it is more expensive. Treasurer Hal Eide said the contractor recommends aluminum seawalls because they stand up better and vinyl is not as strong as aluminum. Jim said the aluminum panels are smaller and stronger. There was extensive discussion as they discussed the materials for the seawalls. Bob suggested the Board have an emergency meeting rather than wait until the next Board meeting to decide. Cliff repeated that we must do this repair. Director Nancy Price asked how long the proposal is good for, and Charlie said it already expired. Jim asked Manager Nancy Barlow to reach out for a 30-day commitment. Resident Jim Browning asked about the expense of the piling logs; they are not included in the quote. The Manager said the engineer drawings are not completed yet. Jim also said most of the material is underground, so color is a moot point. Charlie asked the manager to have Safe Seawalls include the additional seawalls around the condos in the quote. The Board voted to table the motion.

Director Charlie Cannone made a motion to hire AT & I to replace the current security card access system; the materials are made in the US. The Technology Committee will fund this project. The current cards held by residents can be used but need to be uploaded. The Board approved.

Director Nancy Price made a motion to fund the cost of the hedges as a barrier from Wawa up to a cost of \$3000. Lake Worth Drainage removed the original hedges. These hedges will cut down on the noise and car lights from the very busy Wawa. President Jim Czizik asked about a fence at the bridge there. Manager Nancy Barlow said Wawa needs a double gate to access equipment; they plan on installing a chain link fence with a gate. Treasurer Hal Eide asked if we will be trespassing to maintain the hedges. Jim wants a fence that will seal off Leisureville. Nancy said the hedges will deter people from getting into Leisureville. The Board approved.

President Jim Czizik presented 12 properties with fines to be sent to the Fining Appeals Committee. Timelines for fining were discussed. The Board approved.

President Jim Czizik made a motion to approve using the vendor Rock Star Pools to repair the main drain at the Clubhouse 3 pool for \$55K. Permits are included in the quote. Work will begin immediately so the pool can be opened by Thanksgiving. The Board approved.

BOARD WORKSHOP – September 5

The Board of Directors met for a workshop on September 5, 2023, in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3pm. Hal Eide and Holly Massman were on Zoom, Cliff Cole was excused. Manager Nancy Barlow, Assistant Maye Landa and all other members were present.

President Jim Czizik started off with the first agenda item, golf seawalls. Safe Seawalls LLC provided a presentation on materials and their services. The Aluminum 6000 Series product is recommended by the engineers who evaluated the golf seawalls and water, it will not corrode and will last a very long time. Estimated timeline for project completion is one year. Start of repairs will depend on permitting.

Nancy Barlow provided an update on the second agenda item, scrap metal. There has been a large amount of old equipment in the golf maintenance area. We've gotten rid of a lot of big equipment that is no longer needed and it's not in our inventory. It's just been sitting there collecting rust.

Nancy continued with the Wawa fencing and security. For Wawa to get permitting, Lake Worth Water Management District required them to put a turnaround bridge at the end of the L 26 Canal at Congress. When doing so, it unfortunately allowed a complete pass through into Palm Beach Leisureville from the Wawa.

Neighbors are concerned about having people with the availability to walk over from Wawa and walk through the community. We've had Lake Worth Water Management District out there to get verbal permission of putting a gate across their property as well as fencing. We are waiting for the permitting information from Lake Worth Water Management District and for Wawa to give the commitment that they will pay for new fencing to be installed to block off this pathway. That's going to take some time while we go through permitting and the requirements at Lake Worth Water Management District. We would also like to replace the hedge line that was removed. Nancy will update the board with a proposal from CPM. She has one from Mignano. We want to put a temporary fence in there until the hedge line grows thick enough that people stop walking through.

Jim moved onto the next thing, developer interests. There is a parcel of land that dead ends right at Boynton Beach Blvd. It is about 1/2 an acre and then there's about 2.1 acres that sits on top of that. This is not the passive land that was recently granted by the city, that will remain unchanged. Jim was contacted over the weekend by developers that are interested in building. This is a concern to Leisureville because that land a year and a half ago was deemed to be commercial space, now it's being carried out as single family residential. The cost of it has come down substantially, and Jim thinks that developers will at least be approaching Leisureville to see if we would have any problems with the properties or the type of businesses that they would like to bring in. I wanted to put it out to the community that it's out there. You are probably going to have folks reaching out and asking your opinion down the road. From what I understand it's an Armenian church that turned the properties over to a real estate speculator.

Next thing Nancy provided an update on the pools. R1 is still status quo, we're not losing a lot of water. We have structural cracks that are not going away. The deep end of the pool is starting to sink a little bit, but it is safe and usable. It is an issue and will continue to be an issue and resurfacing is not going to fix something like this in the long term. R2 is resurfaced and that is doing well. The pool house has an issue with the leak, it is set up differently than the R1 and R3 pool. It has a cement wall to hold the water, and that has sprung a decent sized leak enough to flood the pool house. We did have to buy two new motors. The concern is, if it's not repaired, there could be future damage to the new motors. We need to move forward to repair the R2 pool house tank. The pool house would have to close for two days to take down a cement wall on the side of the pool house, remove it, rebuild it.

As for R3, we are losing 24,000 gallons of water a month. We have a couple of different decisions to make. To repair the spa and pool, the main drain replacement needs to be done just like R2, it's not even code anymore, that must be done, and we have leaks around the light niches. The other things that are listed in the leak report are gutters, but that could all be repaired with new gutters, just like we did with R2. The main drain and the lightning must be replaced. Regarding if we're going to resurface or not? I have three bids for the resurfacing.

Jim suggested that amongst the board, it would probably be prudent to portion ourselves off because there are three independent pools, we are having issues with. "We should structure a couple of us working to help Nancy out in trying to deduce what's going to be the smartest approach".

Nancy moved onto background checks. Many HOA's do background checks prior to purchase. There's a program out there that does not cost the HOA anything. What it does is it pushes the price over to the person applying for a residence here, rental or purchase. They do not decide. They do not deny. But what it does is someone gets on the computer, does an application, they ask for their driver's license, and completes a credit check prior to purchase. This program will not accept any application until everything is completed. This will relieve the staff from taking time to chase down information from applicants. Nancy ran this by the attorney. There is absolutely no problem with our documents, the problem that we do have is we cannot deny if we deny a sale, we could be challenged because of how our documents read. This would give the Community just a step up and understand who's here. "I think it's a very good set of information for us to have in to make sure people can pay their HOA, make sure that they haven't been foreclosed on in past houses, et cetera."

Nancy moved onto Saunas. Everything has been ordered for the R3 Saunas. I'm expecting in the next week or two the items to come in and ready for installation for both the men's and women's saunas. Jim discussed the Townhall Topics. On Saturday, we're waiting to find out if FPL is in fact going to come. Nancy commented as of last week, it was a yes, he's going to go over hurricane and different things with FPL.

Golden Age Of Hollywood - Steve McQueen



Terence Steve McQueen was born of Scottish descent on March 24, 1930, in Beach Grove, Indiana. He was an actor known for his antihero persona. His box office draw in the counterculture period of the 60's and 70's gave him the nickname "King of Cool". He would use the alias of Harvey Krenner when he engaged in his passion, racing cars, which may have shortened his life. His loner hero types spoke volumes with his actions rather than the dialogue he used. Terence spent time in reform schools yet his fame as being hip and cool lingers more than 40 years after his passing.

Interestingly, Steve's father William, a stunt pilot for a barnstorming flying circus, never married his mother Julia Ann. He left his family for a woman named Julianne Crawford within six months of meeting her. It was alleged Julia Ann was an active alcoholic and that she left Steve with her parents in 1933. Victor and Lillian, the grandparents moved in with Lillian's brother and lived on the farm with his great uncle Claude. The man that left the young Steve with fond memories praising him for being fair and strong teaching the youngster quite a lot.

Claude gave Steve a red tricycle on his 4th birthday which the actor credited as his inspiration for his car racing. In hindsight his birth father may have catalyzed his daredevil public persona as well. When Steve left the farm because his mother had married her first husband, Uncle Claude gave Steve a gold pocket watch, inscribed "To Steve Who Has Been A Son To Me". When Steve left his great uncle and moved back in with his mother, he was beaten by his stepfather and so the young lad took to the streets, and a life of petty crime that landed him in reform school. Moving back and forth to his great uncle's farm twice more Steve finally left home at 14 and joined the circus for a time.

His stepfather had him remanded to the California Junior Boys Clinic in Chino. It was here where Steve, at first, was not accepted but in time began to settle down. After a few run ins Steve was elected to the Boys Council. He left at age 16 but would return after he had become famous and took time to speak to the boys attending the school and established a lifelong association with the center.

At 17 with his mother's permission Steve enrolled in the USMC. As what was his wont Steve didn't conform to Marine life either and ended up in the brig for 41 days. When he was back with the regiment he reformed and was credited with saving 5 Marines while on an Arctic exercise pulling them out of a tank before it broke through the ice. Perhaps as reward Steve was assigned as honor guard aboard the Presidential yacht of Harry S. Truman.

Steve completed three years' service in the Marine Corp and was honorably discharged in 1950 and with financing from the G.I. Bill Steve took up acting at the H.B. School under Uta Hagen. He wound up in the Yiddish Theater and spoke his first line alongside Molly Picon. If you remember Molly was often featured on *Car 54, Where Are You?* Steve made his screen debut in the 1956 film *Somebody Up There Likes Me* starring Paul Newman. Two years later he was the lead in the 1958 sci-fi classic *The Blob*. Even though he was 28 years old playing a teenager no one seemed to care or admit to noticing.

That same year he committed himself to the small screen in the series *Wanted Dead or Alive* which ran for 94 episodes until 1961. Steve's character Josh Randall carried a sawed-off shotgun as his trademark. This series, in case you have an interest, is streaming with the Prime app. (I just watched the opening scene and right

from the jump McQueen grabs your attention.)

Steve galvanized his stardom first in the 1960 remake of a Japanese film* *The Magnificent Seven*. He costarred along with Yul Brynner, Charles Bronson and Robert Vaughn. A historic film featuring vigilante justice as the "7" defended a Mexican village from a marauding band of cutthroats. Vaughn would later also star in McQueen's groundbreaking film *Bullitt* in 1968. Along comes 1963 and McQueen's star rose to prominence in the star-studded cast of *The Great Escape* which would feature Steve riding a motorcycle over hills and dales and barbed wire wooden fences.

The 1960's would see Steve at the height of his stardom as he reeled off hit after hit. Films like *The War Lover* in 1962, *Love with the Proper Stranger* in 1963, (with Natalie Wood) *Soldier in the Rain* that same year with Jackie Gleason, *Baby the Rain Must Fall* in 1965, *The Cincinnati Kid* also 1965 and in 1966 his Oscar nominated role *The Sand Pebbles*. But his performance as a laconic detective helping solve a mob related murder in the film *Bullitt* would turn out to be his piece de resistance. The film featured a car chase through the streets of San Francisco in which Steve performed as star and stunt driver. The sequence would be the blueprint for all car chase scenes yet to come.

In that same year McQueen would take on an against type performance as the elegant jewel thief in *The Thomas Crown Affair* costarring Faye Dunaway a truly memorable performance. In the 70's Steve would continue his superstar status with *The Getaway* in 1972 costarring Ali McGraw who would be his second of his three wives. Memorable also was 1973's *Papillon* with Dustin Hoffman and in 1974 in another star-studded epic *The Towering Inferno*.

Taking a three-year hiatus with a performance in a stage play about a community's polluted water system proved to be just a labor of love as it had limited success and theatrical release. In 1980 McQueen donned the role of the bounty hunter in the period western *Tom Horn* and his final film *The Hunter*.

In 1979 Steve was diagnosed with mesothelioma and with a poor diagnosis sought treatment with laetrile in Mexico. He died November 7th, 1980, after surgery while doctors attempted to remove a tumor. Later it was surmised that his exposure to asbestos caused his death when he wore racing suits while race car driving.

In the spirit of full disclosure McQueen was no picnic to work with. A case in point was when he lost the starring role in *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid* because he insisted top billing over Paul Newman. His incessant obnoxious behavior involving complaining about costumes, lines, being inebriated, taking illicit substances which caused film delays did not enhance his standing with other actors and directors. The list of films he turned down some regarded as masterpieces included, *Apocalypse Now*, *Dirty Harry*, and *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*.

There was also talk of emotional and physical abuse of his wives and lovers. His wife Neile Adams in her tell all book entitled *My Husband, My Friend* chronicled her abuse which followed with his second wife Ali McGraw.

His signature as an unapologetically flawed man had him associated with Barbour Jackets, Persol Sunglasses and TAG Heuer watches. Enigmatic to the end Steve McQueen captivated audiences throughout the 60's and 70's.

Quinoa w/ Wild Arugula

- 1 cup organic dried Quinoa
- 1-cup organic vegetable broth
- 1-cup water

Bring to a bowl, reduce to simmer and keep a lid until all liquid has been absorbed.

Place Quinoa on a plate top with 1 handful wild arugula, chopped tomatoes, avocado, diced onion and jalapeno. Drizzle with olive oil and lemon, top with Himalayan salts.

Kale Salad

- 1 bunch organic kale
- 2 tbs Goat Cheese
- ½ cup pine nuts
- ¼ cup dried cranberries
- Dressing
- 2 tbs olive oil
- 1 tbs Apple Cider Vinegar
- Salt and pepper to taste

Remove the stems from kale and rip kale into bit sizes – ½ tsp of olive oil in a pan – quickly toss the kale in, not to cook, just to slightly wilt. Heat pine nuts in dry pan, toss a few times to avoid burning. In a salad bowl put all ingredients and toss thoroughly.

Kidney Beans and Italian Parsley

- 1 can of dark red kidney beans
- 1 to 1 ½ cups fresh Italian Parsley Leaves
- 1 chopped organic tomato
- ¼ cup diced onion
- ½ diced jalapeno
- ¼ cup organic vegetable broth
- 1 tsp olive oil

Lemon and Himalayan salt to taste

Thoroughly rinse kidney beans for a minimum of 5 minutes in hot water. Saute in olive oil all above ingredients (including the rinsed beans) for just a few minutes, to warm not cook. Squeeze lemon and sprinkle Himalayan salts to taste.

My Favorite Kale Salad

- 1 bunch of organic Kale
- 1 chopped organic tomato
- ½ cup kalmia olives
- ¼ cup finely chopped dulse
- ½ chopped avocado

Remove stems from Kale and tear into bit size bits – in a skillet heat up 1 tsp of olive oil and put in kale and dulse for just a minute or so, just to heat up, not to cook – put on plate and top with the other ingredient – sprinkle with Himalayan salt.

THE CASE FOR THE LEISUREVILLE REC LEASES AND COMMUNITY PROPERTY INFORMATION

This is an UPDATE so those interested will know what is happening with regards to our inquiry regarding the Golf Course and Club House 1/ our Offices.

July was a good month with regards to gathering important information regarding as to who might or might not have ownership claims for the above two properties. Of course, my contention and hope is that PBLCA should have been the owners all along. But we must wait and see.

August has been a slow month. Our Attorney has had to have spinal surgery in New York and has been out of commission. He has been trying to keep on top of everything and has asked for phone conversation. Jim Czizik and I believe a phone conversation would not produce anything of substance. Maybe we are wrong, but we want a sit down with our attorney as soon as possible when he is feeling better. A Face-to-face meeting is always the best when relating information back and forth.

Now we are into Sept As a few of you know, I have been collecting information regarding the History here in Leisureville since 2014 and one of my main interests has been researching the Golf Course and Club House 1, both of which we do not own. My first question was WHY? My research has led me to believe that fraud may have been committed, maybe inadvertently but nevertheless, it might have happened. I have uncovered many discrepancies. For this reason, thanks to Jim Czizik, our President and I have pursued this with an Attorney whose main interest is "Adverse Possession". In our original conversation with the Attorney, he immediately pointed to the fact that nothing seemed to add up. With that our quest began to search for the truth.

To help our Attorney in having a complete history regarding those two properties, last week, Denise one of our office personnel copied my Historical REC book, which is a history of the important facts from 1968 up to 1977 when most of the transactions took place. I believe with this information; our Attorney will be armed with many new facts to help accomplish our goal of obtaining both the Golf Course and Club House 1. This might also go to settle the situation with the REC leases that some of our residents are still paying on. No guarantee but let's keep our fingers crossed.

Leisureville Drivers Refresher Driving Course

Drivers sometimes need a refresher course and a reminder of the necessity for safe driving and the "Rules of the Road". A few of our advanced age and younger residents need reminders of the driving rules when we learned to drive so many years ago. The speed bumps and speed humps on Ocean Drive, 13 Avenue and 22nd Street are very effective for slowing traffic for those who live on those streets. The speed bumps are much appreciated. Kudos to the BOD for their efforts with the City of Boynton Beach to install these safety devices. We see an increasing number of drivers who cut through our neighborhood to get to the new WaWa Service Facility and when there is a wreck on I-95. Although it is nice to have a thriving business on that corner, it has created multiple traffic hazards for Leisureville residents.

We are looking forward to Speed Bumps being installed on 18th Street soon, as that street has become dangerous to pedestrians, bicyclists, residents and dog walkers. Speeding and ignoring stop signs and speed limit signs by "cut through" traffic and our own residents. For those who are still working, leave 10 minutes earlier to avoid the rush and don't exceed the speed limit in our community. Drag racing is not permitted on any of our streets.

You have a speedometer on your dash. USE IT!!



This sign means what it says. In other words, your tires must stop rolling in order to obey this sign. That means a complete stop at every stop sign, even when no one is looking. Make sure the road is clear to the left and the right.

If you arrive at this sign first, then you can proceed. Courtesy also plays an important role at this sign. Otherwise, you may encounter the "bird" signal from the other drivers. This is not a nice sign.



Ignoring this sign and driving over the bump at more than 15 miles per hour will not only damage your vehicle but also your neck or head as it impacts the roof of your car. You may also lose control of the car and your bladder.

A word of caution to those who ride scooters, electric bikes and electric scooters:

If you ride one of these vehicles in the street, YOU ARE CONSIDERED A CAR and must obey the rules the same as Automobiles. If you get T-Boned by a car running a stop sign, YOU ARE AT FAULT!! And you may be seriously injured or killed. At the very minimum, wear a helmet!!! wear shoes!!! Obey street signs like required for a car.

We should all strive to make this neighborhood a safe one for drivers, pedestrians, bicyclists, dog-walkers and visitors to Leisureville.

Architectural Corner

General rules and information for residents at PBL include the following:

1. Behavior which unnecessarily or unreasonably disturbs others is considered to be in violation of our rules.
2. Members are requested to courteously call attention to any violation they may observe. If the violation persists, the appropriate committee shall be notified for appropriate action which, as a last resort, can result in legal action.
3. Any member who wishes for the attention of the Board must put the information in writing and leave in the Association office. UNSIGNED COMPLAINTS WILL NOT RECEIVE CONSIDERATION. ORAL COMPLAINTS WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED, NOR WILL COMPLAINTS PHONED OR TAKEN TO COMMITTEE MEMBER'S HOMES.

We want you to enjoy Leisureville. Participate in helping your neighbors to run the community smoothly and efficiently.

I will illustrate a problem that the ACC has encountered. We will use roofs as an example. First here are the regulations for Roofs.

101.11 ROOFS

Roof maintenance, repair and replacement: Roofs shall be maintained in good condition. Repair exceeding \$1,000.00. Requires both ACC approval and the required permit from the City of Boynton Beach. Temporary repairs with the use of tarps are permitted for 30 days at which time an Improvement Application for permanent repair or replacement must be submitted to the ACC committee. After approval by the ACC, repair or replacement of the roof must be completed within 90 days.

Pitched cement tile roofs shall be flat or barrel white tile. The tile manufacturers specifications must be suitable for painting and power washing.

Pitched Metal roofs may be utilized if a sample is presented for ACC review and approval. White metal roofs are to be maintained in good condition free of mold and mildew by homeowner.

Foam roof coating may be applied over existing roof with a required Improvement Application, including the manufacturer's specifications and product approval.

Asphalt Shingles, Rolled or Any Unapproved Roofing on pitched roofs is not permitted on houses for repair or replacement.

Materials must meet the city of Boynton Beach Building Codes and Dade County Hurricane codes. The modification of a flat roof that incorporates hip or gable ends shall require, the Improvement Application, certified engineering plans (that need to include complete specifications and dimensions) for preliminary review of the ACC. Upon review by the ACC, the plans will be presented to the Board of directors for review and final approval. The decision of the Board of Directors shall be final.

NOTE: the height of such modifications may not exceed the buildings original roofline. All work must have a city of Boynton Beach permit before any construction can commence.

NOTE: The instillation of any roof shall not commence before obtaining both ACC approval and the required building permit from the city of Boynton Beach.

If you notice a roof being done without a building permit and ACC approval please let the administration know and they will take appropriate measures. You need to be the eyes and ears of Palm Beach Leisureville.

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

The A/A Burger: is served on leaf lettuce with plenty of cheddar cheese accompanied by sweet potato fries.


The East Lantana Burger: smothered with bacon (seriously!), fried egg with chipotle sauce and shoestring onion rings. Great price, too.

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
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

Landscape Committee News

Your HOA fees include weed spray for grass areas. Call the office for an appointment; now is the time of year to get weeds under control. Your weeds get cut and taken to the neighbor's yards by mowers & blowers. Help stop the spread; call the office 561-732-7474 to be scheduled.

The Landscape Committee provides annual inspections of yards yearly. Please get your yards ready. It will save the volunteers and office a lot of work. These inspections are to help control the cost of landscape and house painting provided by HOA. The LCC inspects properties for the following,

- > Bushes growing over the windows.
- > Bushes above the railing at the front porch
- > Weeds overgrown in plants and flowerbeds.
- > Too many potted plants – only 10 per property, max 5 per side of house.
- > Trees - only 2 per front and back, none on sides of home unless corner lot.
- > Plantings at lamp post must be kept 1 foot below light and no larger than 2' in diameter.
- > Patio privacy hedges are allowed in rear of home around patio area 5-6' height.
- > Fruit trees - (2) are allowed in rear of home only.
- > Norfolk Island Pine Trees (Christmas tree) CAN NOT be planted.
- > Banana Trees are not permitted. Existing bananas limited to 5 trunks.
- > Coconut Trees are not permitted. Existing trees are required to have all coconuts removed in June due to hurricane season.

Landscape Policies also follow city and state Guidelines for Landscape regulations. They change due to environmental impacts. To learn more, a good resource for South Florida plants is www.sfwmd.gov; look for TAB Waterwise. A booklet is available for review. Contact the LCC. Plants that are not native to the area are considered exotic or invasive plants. A list can be found at www.FLEPPC.org and there is a partial list in the Waterwise booklet as well. Unfortunately, some of the plants on the list are still sold in store locally. They maybe on a watch list and not yet banned for local use.

We welcome you join the Landscape committee. We meet the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month in the Administration conference room 3:30. The LCC sponsors the **Green Thumb Award** to properties each month in the newspaper and with a yard sign, You can send in nominations to PBLgreenthumb@gmail.com. What the Painting Contractor will do:

- First, the contractor will perform a Pre-Painting Inspection.
- One week before painting commences, a Notice to Paint will be taped to your front door and garage doors informing you of the painting start date. The Notice will list the final steps you need to take to prepare your home for painting. It will also list anything you wish not to paint such as: Doors, roof, shutters, back patio, Bottom panels of screen enclosure. (Please: make sure to leave mentioned checklist on your door.)
- Prior to painting your home, the entire exterior of your home will be Pressure Cleaned and prepped for painting.
- After painting, a Final Inspection by representative from Coastal Painting and the HOA will be scheduled.
- If you are not living in your house at the time of painting because you are either out of town or renting your home to a tenant, you must provide a contact information for the person or persons you have designated to carry out the required preparations to the Leisureville office.
- Your Primary responsibility is to prepare your house for painting. To help you do this, we have provided on the following page a Checklist that summarizes your required pre-painting preparation.

PRE – PAINTING CHECKLIST

- Remove all vegetation, including vines that you have planted and that adhere to any surface of your home.
- Pull Back all vegetation that you have planted to at least 10” from any surface.
- Remove all decorative items hung on exterior wall surfaces, including nails and screws.
- Make all repairs necessary to the exterior of your home.
- When you receive your Notice to Paint from the painter, remove all window screens, close and lock all windows and doors, and place a rolled-up towel on each window sill and underneath all doors to prevent water from seeping in.
- Remove all furniture and personal items from your porch, patio and store these items inside your home or garage.
- Park all vehicles in your garage. If this is not possible, remove vehicles from your driveway or in front of your house to prevent over-spray.

A Message From Your CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) Palm Beach Leisureville

It's that time when folks leave and head north! Please read the following:

Should our area experience a hurricane or any other type of disaster, there are trained folks in our community who work under the Boynton Beach Fire Department.

It is never too early to prepare the exterior of your home for tropical storms or hurricanes. We are quickly approaching the beginning of the hurricane season. Our team is here to not only access and assist if necessary, but also to ensure our community is ready should we encounter any type of major storm.

All residents who live here full time or expect to be here should have the orange magnet. If not, they are available at the Leisureville office. If we have been issued a Hurricane Warning and you are planning on staying in your home, place the magnet on your front door. CERT members will be riding around prior to the storm and documenting all residents who have remained. After the storm has passed remove the magnet as soon as it is safe to go outside. Our team members will be driving around, not only to check for magnets but to assess possible damage. If you have left your magnet on the door, they will attempt to reach you. If they do not get an answer, they will attempt to enter the house as this is an indication you may have a physical problem.

Now is the time to prepare your property. If you are leaving for the season, NOTHING is to remain outside your home. Patio furniture, all potted plants, decorative items, roof tiles, bags of dirt, bikes, grills, trash and recycle bins, etc. must be stored inside your home or garage. Many of these items are not supposed to be on the exterior of your property at any time. If you have a carport, you need to remove any items that are light enough to be picked up by the wind. The only item that is acceptable is your car. If you have a neighbor or property manager looking after your home, please alert them in case you forget any items.

All trees should be trimmed and thinned out for the hurricane season. All property debris and items from your home should be put in the trash now. This is the time to clean out and trim back.

In the past, our members drove around for two days advising your neighbors, and possibly you, of items that become dangerous during a storm. This is not the responsibility of CERT. If you wait until the last minute to cut your trees, or rid your house and yard of debris or any other type of clean-out/clean-up, this creates a problem. Many residents put out large pieces of trash and clippings from trees and bushes when they hear a storm is coming. If the city has already issued an advisory they may not be collecting. These items become projectiles in a storm.

We hear this is the time to gather your supplies, this is the time to prepare your home and yard. All Leisureville volunteer members of CERT live in our community, have city issued badges and most likely will have large magnets on their vehicles identifying themselves as CERT members. They may also have vests on with the words CERT. We communicate with each other via radios. We do not help prepare your home or yard. We are there to assist should there be an emergency and the fire department and/or police are not able to gain access to our community.

Hoping for a safe and "hurricane free" season!

Emergency Supply Kit Shopping List

Everyone needs to prepare for emergency situations, but shopping for supplies can be expensive and strenuous. Shopping for items a little at a time before an event, can reduce the stress of recovery by avoiding long lines and empty shelves.

Get a Head Start & Be Prepared!

Food Week 1

- 1 Gallon of water per person per day for at least 5 days, for drinking and sanitation
- Sandwich bread (*freeze until needed*)
- 3 Boxes of quick energy snacks (*i.e. granola bars or raisins*)
- 2 Cans of ready-to-eat-soup
- 1 Box of crackers
- Dry cereal
- 4 Cans of fruit
- 5 Cans of meat
- 4 Cans of vegetables
- 1 Jar of jelly or jam
- 1 Large can of juice
- Instant coffee/tea/powdered drinks



Water

Water will be needed for drinking, cooking, and bathing. Store enough bottled water for all members of your family and pets before the storm. Clean water that could be used for bathing & washing dishes is in your water heater.

Storage Week 2

- 2 Boxes of large plastic zip bags
- Plastic wrap
- 2 Rolls of aluminum foil
- Assorted plastic containers with lids
- 3 Boxes heavy-duty garbage bags
- Waterproof portable plastic container with lid

Preserving Food & Important Documents

Electrical power can be off for several days after a storm, so plan for power outages. Also, use waterproof containers to protect important papers.



TO DO LIST Before the Season Starts

- Make a family plan. Who does what and where will your family ride out the storm
- Locate your water meter and electrical shutoff
- Know the disaster plan of your child's school or daycare
- Trim trees and store loose objects
- Install/test your smoke detector
- Use a video camera to tape the contents of your home and store videotape with a friend who lives out of town
- Photocopy important papers and store safely
- Make plans to board your pet if you plan to go to a shelter
- Obtain cash or travelers checks
- Establish an out-of-state contact to call in case of emergency

Keep in a Waterproof Portable Container

- Will, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, stocks, and bonds
- Passports, social security cards, immunization records
- Bank account numbers
- Credit card account numbers and companies
- Inventory of valuable household goods, important telephone numbers
- Family records (*birth, marriage, death certificates*)



Health & First Aid Week 3

- 1 Bottle of shampoo
- 1 Box sanitary hand wipes/liquid
- 1 Large tube of toothpaste
- Antiseptic
- Deodorant
- Tweezers
- Adhesive bandages, assorted sizes
- Rolls of gauze or bandages
- Hydrogen peroxide
- First Aid book
- First Aid tape
- Petroleum jelly
- Rubbing alcohol

First Aid

During a storm, phone and electrical lines go down. Dangerous weather conditions prevent emergency vehicles from responding to emergency situations. Preparing yourself and your family with CPR and First Aid training can save the life of a loved one.



Cleaning & Supplies Week 4

- 2 Packages of eating utensils, paper cups, paper plates
- Facial tissues (*i.e. Kleenex*)
- 2 Rolls of paper towels
- 4 Rolls of toilet paper
- Liquid dish soap
- Mosquito repellent
- Matches
- 2 Pairs of latex gloves
- Broom, mop, and bucket
- Unscented liquid bleach

Use What You Have

Stock up on personal care and cleaning items. Check your supplies now to make sure you have these supplies on hand. Don't forget disposable plates, cups and utensils, paper towels, and toilet paper. Insect repellent and sunscreen should be included. If you have an adequate supply on hand, you will not need to purchase them when you go shopping.



Medications Week 5

- Extra supply prescription medication(s)
- Aspirin and/or acetaminophen
- Anti-diarrhea medicine
- Adult vitamins
- Thermometer



Special Needs Shelter

The county Special Needs Shelter only accepts residents with a physical condition requiring medical or nursing care that cannot be provided for in a general population shelter. Individuals must be able to sleep safely on a cot or mat and meet one of the following criteria:

- Need nursing assistance with medications or medical care administration
- Monitoring vital signs or medical conditions or activities of daily living but do not need hospitalization
- Need constant electrical power for medical equipment

Pre-registration is required for individuals needing to use the Special Needs Shelter.

Tune In

Local media are your primary source of information during disaster. They work with the Emergency Operation Center to provide up-to-date information that can keep you safe. Be sure to have a battery-operated radio and stock up on plenty of batteries. Stay informed about weather conditions, hazards, closed roads, curfews, and relief center locations.

Heavy Tools Week 7

- Plywood & fasteners to cover windows
- Tarpaulin, canvas for temporary roof repair
- Handsaw and/or chain saw & fuel
- Assorted nails
- Wood screws
- Hatchet
- Crowbar



Safety

Most hurricane related injuries occur after the storm when people are cleaning up debris. Wear proper safety gear, make sure you know how to properly use power tools and machinery and never work alone. It may be best to hire skilled and insured professionals to do some work.

Special Items Week 8

- Special foods for special diets
- Extra hearing aid batteries
- Items for denture care
- Spare eyeglasses or contact lens supplies
- 1 Gallon of water per pet
- Leash or pet carrier
- Pet food
- Baby food
- Diapers
- Baby wipes



What You Need

Only you know what you need. Some families will need special items added to their disaster list. These include baby food and baby care items as well as items for your pet. Make sure you have spare batteries for your hearing aid and a spare pair of eyeglasses. Remember *pets are not allowed in general shelters*. If you live in an evacuation zone, *pets can be pre-registered for the Pet Friendly Shelter* by calling (561) 233-1266.

Your Property

Before hurricane season, make a complete inventory of your valuables and personal property. Store important documents and valuables in a safe dry place. If you evacuate, take them with you if you can. Take a photo inventory before the storm and then take photos of any damage after the storm and then take photos of any damage after the storm for your insurance adjuster. Be sure that you are properly insured and understand all of the conditions of your policy prior to a disaster. This will save you from unfortunate surprises during recovery.

Have Patience

Damage after a hurricane is unpredictable. It can take several days, and in some cases, several weeks to restore power. Crews will begin work as soon as they can to clear roads and restore services. Be patient. Plan for loss of power, phones, water, and cable television. Have activities on hand for your family. Remember that everyone in the community is experiencing the same disaster. **DO NOT HOARD FUEL.** *Work together and help your neighbor.*

- ABC certified fire extinguisher
- Smoke detector with battery
- Carbon monoxide detector

Everyday Supplies

Disasters can happen without warning. It is a good idea to have disaster supplies on hand year-round. Make sure you always have a working fire extinguisher, smoke detectors, and a carbon monoxide detector. These items save lives and reduce property damage. To reduce risk of fire, **DO NOT USE CANDLES.** Never use a generator or charcoal grill inside your home or inside your garage.

COOK'S CORNER

Pumpkin Scones

- 2 cups of all purpose flour
- 7 tab. sugar
- 1 tab. baking powder
- 1/2 teas. salt
- 1/2 teas. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teas. ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teas. cloves
- 1/4 teas. ground ginger
- 6 tab cold butter
- 1/2 cup canned pumpkin
- 3 tab. half and half
- 1 large egg

Sugar Glaze Ingredients

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 2 tab whole milk

Preheat oven to 425 degrees; lightly grease a cookie sheet or line sheet with parchment paper. Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and spices in a large mixing bowl. With a fork or food processor, cut butter into dry ingredients until mixture is crumbly and no chunks of butter remain. Set aside. In a separate mixing bowl, whisk pumpkin, half and half and egg. Fold wet ingredients into dry ingredients; form the dough into a ball. Pat out dough onto a lightly floured surface and form it into a 1" rectangle (about 9 inches long and 3 inches wide). Use a large knife to slice the dough into three equal portions. Cut diagonally to produce 6 triangular slices of dough. Place on prepared baking sheet. Bake for 14 to 16 minutes until scones are light brown. Place on wire rack to cool.

Sugar Glaze Directions: Mix the powdered sugar and 2 tab. milk together until smooth. Brush glaze over the top of cooled scones.
