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

Jim Czizik, from Farmingdale, NY, served as an enlisted man in the Army for 2.5 years. He comes from a military background - both his parents were military personnel – His mother a Marine and his father Army Air Corps. "I'm very proud of them," he smiles.

Then, he was actually recruited by West Point and graduated in 1980 – the first class with female cadets. He remembers seeing his parents in tears at the ceremony.

He then was stationed in Ft. Benning, GA as First Infantry Officer, U.S. Training Brigade, supervising over 300 trainees. Then on to Schofield Battalion in Oahu, Hawaii, assigned to the 1srt Battalion, 19th Infantry where he lived for 4 years. "That was one of the best things about my service. A young guy living in Hawaii? C'mon."

From there, his career took him to Ft Riley in Kansas. "I was in charge of B-Company there and right next to us was A Company. That's where the guy who blew up the Oklahoma building was training." What followed then

was a change of command. He became an S4 logistic officer for 5-16 Battalion.

Jim served in "Dessert Shield" and was stationed in Kuwait, Iraq and Saudi Arabia.





"I was an only child and one of the hardest things I ever had to do was to write to my parents before being deployed thinking they might never see me again," he says getting quite emotional.

The service gave Jim the opportunity to travel extensively to places like the Philippines, Japan, Guam and Germany. And, of course, let's n not forget Hawaii, right Jim?

#### NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The PBL Board of Directors held their monthly meeting on November 14th at 3PM at Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom. All members were present except Don Ernst who was excused. In addition, Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Maye Landa were also there. The Board approved the minutes of October 17th. The October Treasurer Report is available at the Association Office.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Director Nancy Barlow gave her managers' report. She talked about the bids for the refurbishment for Clubhouse 2. The "Welcome to Leisureville" will be February 17th, time to be determined. Nancy also encouraged people to get on the nominating committee to help serve the community.

Nancy Barlow reported for the Recreation Committee about the success of the Halloween Dance, where 143 tickets were sold.

Nancy talked about the many work orders that were handled for the month of October. She is very proud of her team. She also discussed power washing of the roofs and sections that will be painted by coastal painting in 2024.

Nancy also reported that it has been determined that only clubs and committees will be allowed to use the grills. Maintenance has to be contacted to turn on the grills.

Director Holly Massman talked about the Condo 22 meeting. The major topics discussed were the speed bumps, electric panels, the new Senate Insurance Bill #154 and new software for the condos.

Director Charlie Cannone reported on the Finance Committee

He said that there were three bids for the new cameras at the clubhouses. The bid from AT&I was accepted with the understanding that it would not exceed \$85,000. Charlie also stated that in May of 2023 the Board approved funding for the remodeling of R2. This was not to exceed \$60,000. To date only one bid has been received and it was for \$63,000. This bid is from the same vendor that did R1. At this time the finance committee feels that the recreation Committee still needs to get three bids.

Director Bob Wilt talked about the ACC committee meeting. There was one violation that was discussed at length. There is also one resident who had three items for the agenda but unfortunately didn't have a plot plan. Until they have a plot plan no action can be taken. The items were tabled.

Director Jim Czizik brought up the memorials on the golf course. The cost of the memorial is \$75, and to maintain it the cost is \$10. Guest who wants to play golf must be accompanied by the owner of the house/condo.

Director Hal Eide brought up COPS. They are looking for past members to return their shirts. Otherwise, they will have to purchase new ones.

Director Cliff Cole brought up the LCC. They didn't have a quorum present so they couldn't move forward with new policy. They are getting ready to start the formal inspection process for sections 1-9W.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

Director Holly Massman made a motion to purchase an 86" Led 4K Smart TV with a wall mount. It would be mounted at the R3 clubhouse. The cost is not to exceed \$1500.

Director Jim Czizik talked about the fining committee. He made a motion to advance the following fines that have been put up because of several letters that were sent to the residents.

#### Updates to the Town Hall Meeting

President Jim Czizik brought up the fact that he has asked that several blasts, channel 63 and the newspaper carry information regarding the distribution of the proxies and how to fill them put. The only caveat is that this needs to be done over 30 days in advance of "Meet the Candidates". The other question that was brought up was term limits. The replacement of any director removed in this section 3.2 shall serve the remainder of the term of any director so removed, any vacancy resulting from voluntary termination of a director services during the first year of a two-year term shall be filled by the board of directors. And such appointments shall continue until the next annual meeting. As such, at the next annual meeting a director shall be elected to serve only one year of the two-year term. Thereafter regular election procedure shall follow.

President Jim Czizik also reported that there has been a rash of residents making threats to our nighttime security company. They have been accosted and spit on just for doing their job. They are our eyes and ears trying to keep us safe. Please show them the respect that they deserve.

#### **BOARD WORKSHOP – November 7**

The Board of Directors met for a workshop on November 7, 2023, in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3pm. Jack McQueen and Don Ernst were excused. Manager Nancy Barlow, Assistant Maye Landa and all other members were present.

Nancy Barlow started off by providing an overview of the election

process, seasonal plantings, reserve study, pending and completed projects. Nancy advised that Lake Worth Water Management District will not allow a gate of any kind to be installed on their land. A replacement hedge line will be installed between Leisureville and Wawa.

Jim Czizik provided an update on speed bumps for SW 18th Street. "I spoke to Mario Guzman hoping he would understand the urgency and need from our community to have something in place. I would like his road calming team to come out here and tell us legally where speed bumps should be placed." Board members had further discussion on speed bumps.

Jim moved onto the town hall this upcoming Saturday the 11th. "We want to talk about proxies and ballots and the process Nancy addressed, at least the initial rendering opinion that we got from our general counsel. We're asking Randall to give us an opinion. That's part of the discussion that we're going to be having on Saturday."

#### It's Falls Prevention Season

Leslie Craig's Strength, Flexibility and Balance Class is Challenging PBL residents to take part in measuring their balance for 8 weeks. The exercises are below and in the Caring Neighbors Office.

Balance Challenge - Everyday at least 10 min for 8 weeks

NAME	
DATE STARTED	
Lift left leg, eyes open	seconds
Lift right leg, eyes open	seconds
Lift left leg, eyes closed	seconds
Lift right leg, eyes closed INSTRUCTIONS:	seconds

- 1. R leg forward L leg back, walking (rocking) motion step back and forth like walking but staying in place. Repeat, holding front leg up then back leg up for a count of ten. Then switch to L leg forward R leg back.
- 2. Side to side, rock back and forth, start to lift R then L foot and hold for a count of ten, continue back/forth.
- 3. Step out front R foot, push off on ball of foot and step back (8x), then to the side and step back, then step back and push off step back in. Repeat other side.
- 4. Knees together bend knee, try to hold 10 sec then switch to other leg.
- 5. Lift knee in front (like #4) hold 10sec, then switch to other leg.
- 6. Extend R leg out to side (keeping leg straight) lift up down 8x then try to hold 10 sec with leg extended. Repeat other side.
- 7. Tight-Rope walk, heel toe walk a few steps forward then a few steps backward and hold in place for 10 seconds

Always have chair close for support. Hold if needed for support eventually lifting hand off as much as possible. Keep practicing! Goal is to hold balance for 10 sec without support. Eventually closing eyes while balancing.

Important! Always have chair, counter, table or something close to hold. You Got This!

#### **Landscape Committee News**

Your HOA fees include weed spray for grass areas. Call the office for an appointment; now is the time of year to get weeds under control. Your weeds get cut and taken to the neighbor's yards by mowers & blowers. Help stop the spread; call the office 561-732-7474 to be scheduled.

The Landscape Committee is comprised of your neighbors, who volunteer to help keep our community attractive and within the guidelines shown on our website for the Landscape Committee. When a property is found to be non-compliant, there is a process that must take place and a reasonable amount of time is given to the homeowner to correct the problem.

Most owners respect the rules. These rules are given out to all homeowners at the orientations. Homeowners sign that they have read the rules and are willing to follow them. Our committee does it's best to ensure all homeowners are treated fairly.

This is the time of year when many residents are returning to Leisureville and working on their homes. Please continue to work with us and follow the guidelines.

The following are some important reminders that are taken from our policy. If you plan on adding plants or trees, please stop by the office and pick up a copy of our Policies and the required application.

Thank you to all homeowners who help all of us by following the rules.

- > Bushes growing over the windows.
- > Bushes above the railing at the front porch
- > Weeds overgrown in plants and flowerbeds.
- > Too many potted plants only 10 per property, max 5 per side of house.
- > Trees only 2 per front and back, none on sides of home unless corner lot.
- > Plantings at lamp post must be kept 1 foot below light and no larger than 2' in diameter.
- > Patio privacy hedges are allowed in rear of home around patio area 5-6' height.
- > Fruit trees (2) are allowed in rear of home only.
- > Norfolk Island Pine Trees (Christmas tree) CAN NOT be planted.
- > Banana Trees are not permitted. Existing bananas limited to 5 trunks.
- Coconut Trees are not permitted. Existing trees are required to have all coconuts removed in June due to hurricane season.

Landscape Policies also follow city and state Guidelines for Landscape regulations. They change due to environmental impacts. To learn more, a good resource for South Florida plants is www.sfwmd.gov; look for TAB Waterwise. A booklet is available for review. Contact the LCC. Plants that are not native to the area are considered exotic or invasive plants. A list can be found at www. FLEPPC.org and there is a partial list in the Waterwise booklet as well. Unfortunately, some of the plants on the list are still sold in store locally. They may be on a watch list and not yet banned for local use.

We welcome you join the Landscape committee. We meet the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month in the Administration conference room 3:30. The LCC sponsors the **Green Thumb Award** to properties each month in the newspaper and with a yard sign, You can send in nominations to **PBLgreenthumb@gmail.com**. #### **NOMINATING COMMITTEE DUTIES**

For those interested in volunteering for this very important duty, the following explains the duties of the Nominating Committee:

- 1) The Nominating Committee shall establish a schedule for final postmark for receipt of nominations, distribution of the election process to candidates, the date of a Special Members Meeting to present the slate, and a date for "Meet the Candidates". These dates shall be announced in December at the Board meeting, in The Leisureville News, on www.mypblca.com and posted on Community Bulletin Boards.
- 2) The Nominating Committee shall announce the number of vacancies for the Board of Directors and advertise for candidates in the Leisureville News, www.mypblca.com and at all Board of Directors meetings for November, December, and January.
- 3) The Nominating Committee shall select candidates and review eligibility by determining membership in PBLCA according to Florida State Statue 720.306(9).

#### **Attention Leisureville Pet Owners**

Several neighborhoods, including Leisureville have reported seeing Raccoons, Iguanas, Buffo Frogs and Coyotes. Several residents on 18th Street reported seeing a large Raccoon in the street, stopped to have an argument with a cat then run up a tree. A neighbor's cat was engaged in a "Mexican standoff" in the front yard. A fight between these two animals could result in a catastrophe for the cat. The same goes for the coyotes, although the cat would have been eaten. There is always the risk of a rabid animal.

Residents are encouraged NOT to let their pets roam our neighborhood at night. If they are bitten and come in the house, the resident could be infected with rabies. We have enough to worry about without another health risk.

Many animals such as Iguanas, Buffo Frogs, Muscovie Ducks and Pythons are invasive and cause extensive damage to our environment and natural wildlife. Elimination of these pests is ongoing in our state due to their massive numbers. Road and bridge infrastructure is severely damaged by Iguanas as well as pools and roofs.

It is recommended that we not encourage wildlife by feeding them and keeping them as pets. Ducks are sometimes relocated, while others are euthanized. Animal control telephone number in Boynton is 561 742 6210.



#### What the Painting Contractor will do:

- First, the contractor will perform a Pre-Painting Inspection.
- One week before painting commences, a Notice to Paint will be taped to your front door and garage doors informing you of the painting start date. The Notice will list the final steps you need to take to prepare your home for painting. It will also list anything you wish not to paint such as: Doors, roof, shutters, back patio, Bottom panels of screen enclosure. (Please: make sure to leave mentioned checklist on your door.)
- Prior to painting your home, the entire exterior of your home will be Pressure Cleaned and prepped for painting.
- After painting, a Final Inspection by representative from Coastal Painting and the HOA will be scheduled.
- If you are not living in your house at the time of painting because you are either out of town or renting your home to a tenant, you must provide a contact information for the person or persons you have designated to carry out the required preparations to the Leisureville office.
- Your Primary responsibility is to prepare your house for painting.
   To help you do this, we have provided on the following page a Checklist that summarizes your required pre-painting preparation.

#### PRE - PAINTING CHECKLIST

- Remove all vegetation, including vines that you have planted and that adhere to any surface of your home.
- Pull Back all vegetation that you have planted to at least 10" from any surface.
- Remove all decorative items hung on exterior wall surfaces, including nails and screws.
- Make all repairs necessary to the exterior of your home.
- When you receive your Notice to Paint from the painter, remove all window screens, close and lock all windows and doors, and place a rolled-up towel on each window sill and underneath all doors to prevent water from seeping in.
- Remove all furniture and personal items from your porch, patio and store these items inside your home or garage.
- Park all vehicles in your garage. If this is not possible, remove vehicles from your driveway or in front of your house to prevent over-spray.

# Research finds volunteering can be good for your health.

If it is a Tuesday morning, you'll find Dan Diamond in New York teaching photography to seniors. On Wednesday he is coaching small business owners through a nonprofit. On other days, he helps in a photography class, mentors teens, visits homebound seniors and volunteers at a Harlem jazz museum.

Diamond is 78, he worked six days a week in the bridal-gown business before retiring in 2009. He sees the 15 to 20 hours he volunteers each week as necessary. "You have to interact with people," he says, "or your brain really dries up."

His attitude tracks with emerging science about the health impacts of volunteering. A study of 2,700 volunteers aged 18 and older from United Healthcare and VolunteerMatch found that 75% of those who volunteered in the past year said volunteering made them feel physically healthier.

#### **Slowing Decline**

A much larger study – one involving more than 64,000 subjects aged 60 and older from 1998 to 2010 – found results suggesting that volunteering slows the cognitive decline of aging. The author of the study, Sumedha Gupta, an assistant economics professor at Indiana University, used data from the long running University of Michigan Health and Retirement Study to reach her conclusions. After dividing respondents into 3 categories – volunteers, nonvolunteers and individuals who switched back and forth – she found that an individual volunteering 100 hours a year scores on average about 6% higher in cognitive testing than a non-volunteer. The effect is significant. It's consistent," Dr. Gupta said.

The study's methodology controlled for variables such as a person's initial health and considered external influences that would force subjects to reduce their volunteering hours. Dr. Gupta was also careful to treat as separate issues the subjects' emotional well-being and presence of depression.

"If you keep everything else constant by putting in all these controls and following the individual over time," she said, "we find that as people volunteer, their cognitive health scores improve. If they don't volunteer, their cognitive scores decline faster."

The reason behind volunteering's boost to cognitive health, Dr. Gupta says have to do with the unique characteristics of such activity. For starters, unlike paid work, there is a "difference subjective wellbeing" or "warm glow" that volunteers experience from helping people. Volunteering is also unique "because it supplies mental, physical and social stimulation in one package," Dr. Gupta said. "You have to move around, you interact with people, you think about activities." Whereas doing a sudoku puzzle offers one type of intellectual stimulation, she said, volunteering gets all of these types of stimulation simultaneously. When you volunteer, you are not only using your brain and making decisions, you are helping others, which should make you feel good. Bear in mind when you volunteer you are putting your brain to work. I am a firm believer in the theory, "Use it or lose it."

More is better.

Dr. Gupta's advice to seniors is that if they're well enough, they should consider volunteering, and if they're already volunteering, they should consider devoting more time each week. The data showed cognitive benefits with as little as 2 to 2 ½ hours of volunteering each week, on average, she said.

Diamond says his volunteering schedule keeps him in a "nice routine". His only nonvolunteering day is Friday, on which he decided to start taking saxophone lessons.

#### **NOEL SESAME COOKIES**

1 Cup butter, softened

1/4 Cup sugar

1 Teas. Almond extract

2 Cups all purpose flour

1/4 Teas salt

1//3 Cup sesame seeds

1/3 Cup candied cherries, red or green, halved

In large mixing bowl with electric mixer at medium speed, cream butter and sugar until light and flufffy, scraping sides of bowl occasionally, add almond extract, flour and salt. Wrap and chill dough for one hour. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Shape dough into one inch balls, roll in sesame seeds. Place on parchment lined cookie sheet. Press candied half cherry into center of each cookie. Bake for 10 minutes and cool.

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

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
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#### **Condo-22 COALITION**

The first meeting of the Condo-22 Coalition for the 2023-2024 winter season was held in R-1 on November 13, 2023. The meeting was well attended with 16 of the 22 condo associations of PBL in attendance, as well as the PBL Board Liaison, Holly Massman.

Barbara Kaczmarczyk (of Building N) began the meeting at 1 PM with reminders regarding our housekeeping duties and the need for small occasional donations to help offset printing costs.

Connie Pinelli (of Building O) worked the door, took attendance, and also passed out Agendas. Agenda items

- · Upcoming Cooperator EXPOs we're mentioned. There will be one at the Broward County Convention Center in Fort Lauderdale on December 7, 2023. Barbara encouraged folks to try to attend at least one Expo a year, as they are offered regularly in this area during the upcoming months. Very beneficial information can be obtained, and many reputable vendors are there to meet and greet.
- Barbara asked those folks from along Lake Terrace what they have observed since speed bumps were installed a few months ago? Several commented that they may be poorly placed. Some cut-through drivers are by-passing them by speeding through some buildings' parking lot/ driveway. Residents were urged to get their fellow owners to sign a list that they have observed abuse at affected condo associations, take pictures if they can. They should also speak up at Town Hall Meetings.
- The inevitable need to replace our unsafe and antiquated electrical panels in all owners' units and the condo buildings themselves was mentioned and discussed. Insurance carriers are inspecting our condo buildings and requiring their replacement. They threaten cancellation. It appears that the cost is between \$20-25,000 per panel room. This replacement task is a huge financial burden for our associations. How to pay for it?
- The topic of closing down a condo corporation, how to do it, how does it affect PBL? Barbara asked if this was a worthy future topic? \*Response was to find a speaker and work on a presentation.
- · The history of Leisureville and Leasing was brought forth. Bob Wilt of the PBLCA Board of Directors is very knowledgeable on this subject. What about recreational leases for some condo owners that do not hold title to theirs? This is another worthy topic that will be set up for an upcoming meeting of Condo-22. We will try to arrange for Bob to speak to us in January when more interested people will be here for the season.
- Barbara distributed a handout outlining the latest law to impact condos in Florida SB-154. The printout listed important facts that became law in June of 2023 regarding Milestone Inspections and Structural Integrity Reserves Studies (SIRS). \* Currently all of Leisureville Condo associations are Exempt. However, a few facts presented must be considered by us, as well. Our buildings are more than 30 years old. We are judged as a community to be in close proximity to the Ocean's influence(about 3 miles away). Condo associations should be proactive with inspections and maintenance. Legislation is continuing to evolve. Boynton Beach may choose to inspect us for structural integrity and general safety. Condo Associations need to consider more than painting, paving and roofing. There are aged electrical systems(which we already know about), plumbing concerns, and exposed elevated walkways for some of us. The replacement or refurbishment of these systems or structures are ticketed at more than \$10,000. How to pay for it? SIRS guidelines encourage the use of Pooled Reserves for use in an immediate solution, but with restrictions. We must stay on top of this whole process.
- Borrowing Money as a small not-for profit corporation is permitted under Florida Law. it requires some legal advice and financial guidance to decide on acquiring a Loan or a Credit Line. how much? from what source? \* This is an IMPORTANT topic and Barbara will try to arrange for speakers at our **DECEMBER 11th meeting**.
- Barbara has been asked to provide a "Zoom-like" hook up for people who are unable to attend our meetings. She does not know how to do it but Calvin McDaniel (Building J) will assist in this endeavor and we should be able to provide a link to access our next meeting.

Calvin then took the floor and spoke on many important topics:

- He introduced a free and relatively easy software program to his building's accounting practices. It is an alternative to the spreadsheet method currently employed by many. You use a computer [not a phone or an I-Pad] and set it up to automatically send out payment reminders and keep tabs on the prompt payment of fees and assessments. It will notify delinquent owners within 30 days and send out notices of intent to place a lien on the associated properties. Delinquency in his building has gone down from 30% to practically zero.
- В. Associations should separate their Checking account, used for everyday expenses, and the Reserves. All of the later maybe pooled in 1 account, but separated into a Savings account.
- Calvin has set up a website for Condo J. He loaded the association documents, he included contact information for owners to access and a quick way to announce local information, etc. Calvin is willing to help other associations set something like that up, and start it running.
- D. He will set up a free connection [ similar to zoom, goggle me, and other forms] for our next meeting. STAY TUNED and a link will be

published by Condo-22 Coalition so that absentee owners can watch and listen in to our next meeting (December 11, 2023).

- He spoke also about nearby neighbors in houses parking their extra cars in condo J's lot. They were given a first notice, then they were advised to move them out, then building J followed through and the car(s) were towed away at the owners expense......problem solved. F.Make sure that any work done on units or the building itself are always
- done with PERMITS and by licensed contractors. Question your owners about work done on their units.
- G. Calvin spoke about the upcoming PBL election for the Board of Directors. There are several openings. Condo owners should seriously think about volunteering to serve and get their resumes in order. We are 502 votes and there is a need for a minimum of 692 votes to elect any candidate in a legitimate election. We are a powerful voting block. Please consider running and serving our community as a whole.

Other topics for future meetings can be breaking away from Comcast, as an association. Nearby, Boynton Beach Leisureville (as a community), has voted to oust Comcast and are transferring their TV and Internet access to HOTWIRE, a fiber optic company. A cheaper way to access services is something many PBL Condo owners would appreciate.

Balancing budgets for 2024 has proven to be difficult for all associations. Another large jump in insurance cost is expected and inflation of 3-10% is rampant for any goods or services. It was concluded that Maintenance Fees need to be raised dramatically but must be done to be realistic and provide a balanced budget. Folks were reminded that Florida law sees Special Assessments as rare and used for expensive maintenance, not everyday expenses. Even a monthly Maintenance Fee of about \$500 to live in Palm Beach Leisureville is cheaper than many other Condo communities in our area. The meeting was adjourned at 2:30.
