The flea market is a totally volunteer organization and is one of the largest fund raisers in the community. The proceeds are used to defray the monthly maintenance fees and accepts donations on Monday and Wednesday mornings

Jo Ann Cirillo, chairperson of the Rec Committee, gives a little history of the flea market. "Years ago, a couple of women got together and collected items to be sold. Then, Donna King got involved and ran a small market on Wednesdays. Two times a year, Donna would create a huge sale at Rec 3. Seeing its success, she then opened on Saturdays and brought it to what it is today – a successful fund raiser. Last season, the proceeds were \$47K!"

"It became quite a project and so along came Vicky White who assisted Donna until her retirement. It was then moved to its current location at R2. Vicky continued its progress and brought on Annamarie Pieris and Diane Gunther as co-chairmen. Annamarie now schedules the furniture pickups while Diane moderates the Décor department where she displays collectibles, antiques and better items. Our newcomer, Gerry Park, always with a smile, delights in pricing and sales of the outdoor table wares."

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

There, Andy spent two years training and piloting Marines. "My term was actually up in 18 months but I really loved what I was doing so I stayed on", he



Racks Fish House & Oyster Bar in Delray was our choice last month. A very popular place just off Atlantic Avenue, it featured a "50% off" Happy Hour, both drinks and food (ended October

The four of us decided to share two appetizers since we all had each chosen a different entree. The first was Crab & Georgette Beignets with Tomato jam. Although it looked delicious, we found it to be quite bland disappointing. The better of the two was Millionaire Mac & Cheese: full of lobster chunks in a creamy cheesy sauce! Definitely a "come back for" dish.

Entrees: 1. The Day Boat: an ample assortment of shellfish and flounder sauteed to perfection. This could definitely be a 'shared' entrée.

- 2. Lobster Risotto: creamy dish, full of and topped with lobster chunks served in a piping hot casserole. One of the house favs.
- 3. Coconut-Curry Mussels: plump morsels drenched in the tasty sauce and topped with lightly toasted bread points. This Diva wished it to 'never end'. She also ordered some roasted corn as a side which really complimented the entrée.
- 4. Sushi: a variety of different fish (you choose your own) served traditionally on flat dish with spices on the side. Of course, chop sticks but a fork is readily available upon request. The portions are large leaving some to take home.

A classified ad is for residents who wish to sell or rent something (home, goods, services, etc.) If bringing to the office, use an envelope and write "Leisureville News" on the envelope along with your check in the correct amount and your ad or classified form, Leave it in the office or you can mail the check (the address is on top of the form). We must have your check within 5 days after you submit the ad.

Classified ad forms and business ad forms can also be downloaded from the web. Go to www.mypblca.com and click the newspaper link. Then click on e-forms and print the appropriate one,

The Palm Beach Leisureville newspaper has an electronic office. We have a telephone number that anyone who wants to run/publish an ad in our paper can call to get information. Someone will return your call in a timely manner, but you must leave a detailed message with a call back phone number, your name and some idea as to why you are calling. 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#### NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The PBL Board of Directors held their monthly meeting on Tuesday September 17th at 3 PM in Clubhouse 3 and on zoom. All members were present except Jim Czizik, and Charles Cannone (Hal on zoom). Manager Nancy Barlow and Asst. Manager Maye Landa were also present. Don Ernst said that the August treasurers report is available at the office. Nancy Barlow gave her managers' report. In it were reminders about locking your car doors and also that no solicitors are allowed on the property. The community will be getting a mailing regarding Florida statue by October 1st. This mailing will give you reference as to where the rules, regulations and documents can be found on the website. There will also be hard copies at the office.

Cliff Cole gave a report on CAP. The next meeting is September 18th. Cliff gave a big thank you to Mike Rizzo regarding the garbage containers at the golf course. Cliff also mentioned an ice machine at R2. Cliff said there is a stepped up air pressure machine in the works for R3. Cliff discussed getting a cover for the bocce courts.

Nancy Price gave a report on the golf committee. The men's and women's league rates have gone up to \$20.00. There are sandboxes on every hole. The front nine was aerated on 9/10 and the back nine on 9/11. There aren't any bats in the bat boxes. They are discussing irrigation in the water. November 4th will be the opening of the golf shop. Hot dog Sundays will start in December. The shop will be open on Thursday mornings when the ladies league starts.

Hal Eide gave a report on the finance committee meeting which took place on August 22nd. The financial statements of July 24th were unanimously approved. They discussed the 2025 budget at a special finance committee meeting 9/12, the R2 remodel project, and R1 pool project. Surveys had been sent to the bidders. A buy in contribution project was discussed for new homeowners. This was only a discussion topic. At the September 12th special meeting, the proposed 2025 budget was developed by Campbell and Finance and was reviewed; lots of questions were asked. The proposed budget was unanimously approved. A complete copy will be sent to the Board for their review. A motion will be made at the October meeting for the Board to accept the 2025 financial statements. Hal Eide, presented for Charlie Cannone a motion to accept the July 2024 financial statements. The intent/purpose of this motion is to keep the Board of Directors up to date on the associations monthly financial position. The rationale is that it's required by the associations governing documents, and neither implementation, cost or responsible party is applicable to this motion.

Patrick Barklow made a motion to add Chris Hardan to the ACC committee immediately. The ACC voted yes unanimously to fill the vacancy because of a resignation. Chris is a former contractor, has worked in the construction industry and is a property owner and resident here. The implementation will be by a vote of the Board of Directors. There is no cost or no one paying for cost. The motion carried. Patrick Barlow made a motion to have fines levied against certain properties at the October 15th meeting, the motion carried for the levied fines.

Don Ernst had a personal comment. He complimented Steve Schone on doing a great job running the town hall meeting. Nancy Barlow thanked Calvin with writing on the work trucks.

Patrick Barklow gave a report on the ACC meeting. On September 3rd there were 33 applications for improvements of which 26 were approved. At today's meeting there were 18 applications and 15 were approved.

Resident Jim Browning brought up the Habitat for Humanity house. Habitat had a contractor build the second story. He didn't have permission from the ACC. Nancy Barlow said Habitat had the ACC rules 2 ½ years ago. The person whom Nancy gave the communication to isn't there anymore since they merged the two Habitat for Humanity. They are going to tear the roof down. The new roof will comply with the rest of Leisureville. Lynn Kordower

Please remember you must obtain ACC & LCC approvals for any exterior modifications made to your home according to our ACC Rules and Regulations and for any new plantings or modifications to your lawn/property according to our LCC Policy Rules & Regulations. Applications are available at the office. We will be happy to assist you on any questions you might have with the application process.

Please note, as per Florida Statutes, any work being done without the proper approvals may be subject to fines and access to the common areas and facilities could be suspended.

ARCHITECTURAL & LANDSCAPE PROPERTY IMPROVEMENT APPLICATIONS

**Please note**: Your Property Improvement application and/or Landscape Application may be delayed if violations exist and/or fines owed to the Association are outstanding on the property.

There should be no delay if you are applying for approval on a violation you have received.

#### **ATTN PBL LANDLORDS ~ VERY IMPORTANT**

PBL Owners: If you plan on leasing your property, the city of BB requires you to obtain an occupational license for rentals (Article 1, Section 6514, City of Boynton Beach). You will find further information on the top (third bullet point) of our rental application. If you are renting to a new tenant, we require a new application be completed along with a \$100 application fee. Please contact the office to obtain a rental application and we'll be happy to assist you in the process or visit the PBL website for a digital copy. All rentals must be approved by the Association for any person residing more than 30days. If your current renter's lease is soon to expire, the office must have an updated lease on file every year as per PBL's governing documents. Non-compliance could result in a violation of an Unauthorized Tenant living in your home, and you could potentially incur fines. Access cards to the facilities will be deactivated on the date your renter's lease ends. A new photo with the new lease expiration date on the existing access card is required with lease renewals. If you are no longer renting out your home, please notify the office. If you have any questions, please call the office at 561-732-7474 or email leasing@ mypblca.com.

PROPERTY INSPECTIONS - are completed throughout the year in accordance with Palm Beach Leisureville's Governing Documents. If you receive a letter, please consider it a friendly reminder to make necessary maintenance improvements. Campbell Property Management enforces the ACC, LCC and General policies and sends out notices to inform you of the maintenance repairs observed during the inspection. If everyone adheres to the guidelines, the outcome will prove to be a positive place to live for all residents. For the month of August 2024, the inspection team inspected 294 properties which includes LCC, ACC, Coach Lights Out and Parking violations. 141 violations were mailed out and 153 noncompliance violations were closed out. #### **Landscape Committee**

The Landscape committee will now be performing on-going inspections of all properties. This is an on going process. All of our members wear identification badges. We thank you in advance for your cooperation and compliance.

Your HOA fees include weed spray for grass areas. Call the office for an appointment; now is the time of year to get weeds under control. Your weeds get cut and taken to the neighbor's yards by mowers & blowers. Help stop the spread; call the office 561-732-7474 to be scheduled.

The Landscape Committee is comprised of your neighbors, who volunteer to help keep our community attractive and within the guidelines shown on our website for the Landscape Committee. When a property is found to be non-compliant, there is a process that must take place and a reasonable amount of time is given to the homeowner to correct the problem.

Most owners respect the rules. These rules are given out to all homeowners at the orientations. Homeowners sign that they have read the rules and are willing to follow them. Our committee does it's best to ensure all homeowners are treated fairly.

This is the time of the year when many residents are leaving for the season. Please remove all flower pots, decorative flags, and any other items that can become dangerous should we have any storms.

The following are some important reminders that are taken from our policy. If you plan on adding plants or trees, please stop by the office and pick up a copy of our Policies and the required application.

Thank you to all homeowners who help all of us by following the rules.

- > Bushes growing over the windows.
- > Bushes above the railing at the front porch
- > Weeds overgrown in plants and flowerbeds.
- Too many potted plants only 10 per property, max 5 per side of house.

- > Trees only 2 per front and back, none on sides of home unless corner lot.
- > Plantings at lamp post must be kept 1 foot below light and no larger than 2' in diameter.
- > Patio privacy hedges are allowed in rear of home around patio area 5-6' height.
- > Fruit trees (2) are allowed in rear of home only.
- > Norfolk Island Pine Trees (Christmas tree) CAN NOT be planted.
- > Banana Trees are not permitted. Existing bananas limited to 5 trunks.
- > Coconut Trees are not permitted. Existing trees are required to have all coconuts removed in June due to hurricane season.

Landscape Policies also follow city and state Guidelines for Landscape regulations. They change due to environmental impacts. To learn more, a good resource for South Florida plants is www.sfwmd.gov; look for TAB Waterwise. A booklet is available for review. Contact the LCC. Plants that are not native to the area are considered exotic or invasive plants. A list can be found at www. FLEPPC.org and there is a partial list in the Waterwise booklet as well. Unfortunately, some of the plants on the list are still sold in store locally. They may be on a watch list and not yet banned for local use.

Lastly, We welcome you to join the Landscape committee. We meet the 2nd Tuesday of each month in the Administration conference room at 11:00 AM. The LCC sponsors the **Green Thumb Award** to properties each month in the newspaper and with a yard sign, You can send in nominations to **PBLgreenthumb@gmail.com**. #### **Board Workshop - August 6**

The PBL Board of Directors met for a workshop meeting on September 3, 2024, in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3PM. Present were Vice President Don Ernst, Secretary Bob Wilt, Treasurer Hal Eide, Assistant Secretary Holly Massman, and Directors Nancy Price, Charlie Cannone, and Patrick Barlow. Additionally present were Property Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Property Manager Maye Landa.

Nancy Barlow presented the Management Report. She informed members that Steve Shone will do a presentation of the Reserve Study at the next Town Hall meeting September 14 at 1PM.

The 2025 Budget will be reviewed by the Finance Committee on September 12; at that time, if all are in agreement, it will be put on the October Board agenda for a vote.

She also informed those present that there are new regulations in place that forbid Board Governance from voting on any item that is not on the meeting agenda; this will be enforced by Florida statutes going forward.

Inspections by the Landscape Committee are underway and will continue throughout the year; note that these are carried out by LCC volunteers, not Campbell Property Management. Letters are being sent to homeowners, usually asking them to trim back overgrowth. The first letter sent is a courtesy notice and the homeowner has thirty days to comply

Emails were sent last week regarding a person going door to door in the community purporting to be from Campbell and offering to do odd jobs such as wash windows. This was a fraudulent activity, and some homeowners lost money to this individual. He was reported to police and they were given the Ring camera photo that Nancy sent out to residents so they can hopefully apprehend him. Nancy reminded everyone that Campbell and CPM personnel all wear identifying shirts so that you know you are dealing with one of our workers.

Nominating Committee activities will be starting up in the coming weeks.

We had our annual fire inspection; some minor items were noted and are being addressed.

With regard to the R2 water usage, Nancy reports that the City states that there is definitely water being lost. Follow up with the pool company identified no issues with leakage from the pool, and the leak detection company also found no issues with water loss. We now believe that the problem is with the water meter at R2 and are following up again with the City.

Clubhouse roofs need to be cleaned, we have two bids and are waiting for a third from Coastal.

As of Friday, we have 910 linear feet of the seawall completed; our irrigation team is doing the backfill with a jet pump that Safe Seawalls is allowing us to use

Annual contracts are coming up for review. Nancy is working on the golf contract which is up in November, waiting for bids from three companies; also waiting for bids for painting and pressure washing. There is no painting scheduled until 2026. Paving is due west of 18th street. One bid has been received; Nancy has asked that they refigure the bid with the addition of the three clubhouse parking lots and thermofilm at stop signs.

We had to add a light at the R3 clubhouse hot tub in order to be within Health Department code. Additionally, the spa leak was repaired but there are still problems with pressure. A blockage was found by a camera company and we are waiting to receive that film before we proceed. The jet covers were removed to create more pressure for now.

Holiday lighting/uplighting issues await decisions regarding locations.

The survey for the R1 pool was received and sent to Roberts Pools; they will take it to the City for input so we have a better idea what we can and cannot do, to allow us to better judge pricing and plans.

With regards to aeration of the golf course lakes for midge control, we are waiting for Cascade Fountains to come out next week to give input.

We don't have a start date as yet for the R2 remodel but Notice of Commencement was signed and Gemstone took it to the City last week.

We are still working to identify fifteen houses to test sealant products that will diminish the mildew on rooftops. Forty emails were sent to homeowners, ten responses received. We intend to test 3-4 different products to determine which gives the best results.

Vice President Don Ernst asked each member to bring up any issues they wanted to discuss.

Secretary Bob Wilt reported on activities related to Adverse Possession. Director Patrick Barlow asked where we stand on covering for the bocce courts and wonders if we could use something like the canvas coverings we have by our pools. Bocce was cancelled Thursday because of slippery grass around the courts and installation of a sidewalk was suggested. Assistant Secretary Holly Massman report that the Community Advisory Panel (CAP) is working on this issue. A dollar value for the intended solution needs to be determined and presented to the Board for approval. She also reports that the CAP has been working on the issue of the golf course dumpster and improvements are underway and the area is

looking much better thanks to Mike Rizzo.

Director Charlie Cannone reported that he is working on the issue of violations and fines; feedback has been received and research is still in progress. He believes we can target 1/1/2025 as an implementation date; this will give sufficient time to complete investigation and feedback as well as time to roll out the program to the community members at a Town Hall or via survey, and allow for final approval at the December Board meeting.

Manager Nancy Barlow reported that the 13th Way home is being changed and brought to ACC required dimensions.

The meeting was opened to the community members. Resident Vivian asks if we should consider marking out community vehicles to identify them to residents as ours. Manager Nancy Barlow agrees that we need to replace the magnetic signage on the sides of the vehicles to more clearly identify those that are property of the community. Gail Harrigan

#### PBL LEISUREVILLE BOOK CLUB

Do you like to read? Have you read a book that made you laugh out loud or cry? You are not alone. Although reading books is a solitary pursuit, the Palm Beach Leisureville Book Club is a place to share your thoughts and hear other perspectives on a variety of books. PBL Book Club started in March 2024 and many members had never participated in a book club before. A member commented that the Book Club has encouraged them to begin reading again. A few book club veterans stated it has them reading books that they otherwise would not have selected.

If you are not a reader, research supports reasons to start reading. According to a 2016 study published in the journal Social Science & Medicine, any level of book reading gave a significantly stronger survival advantage, particularly for adults 65 and older who redirect leisure time from watching TV into reading books. Other advantages found from book reading include (1) opportunities to become more empathetic and see other viewpoints, (2) helps lessen cognitive decline, (3) reduces stress and (4) improves critical thinking.

The PBL Book club is open to all and there is no charge to attend. We select a variety of genres of books (historical fiction, thrillers, Florida themed books etc.) and members read the same book each month. We meet the second Thursday of each month.



## What the Painting Contractor will do:

- First, the contractor will perform a Pre-Painting Inspection.
- One week before painting commences, a Notice to Paint will be taped to your front door and garage doors informing you of the painting start date. The Notice will list the final steps you need to take to prepare your home for painting. It will also list anything you wish not to paint such as: Doors, roof, shutters, back patio, Bottom panels of screen enclosure. (Please: make sure to leave mentioned checklist on your door.)
- Prior to painting your home, the entire exterior of your home will be Pressure Cleaned and prepped for painting.
- After painting, a Final Inspection by representative from Coastal Painting and the HOA will be scheduled.
- If you are not living in your house at the time of painting because you are either out of town or renting your home to a tenant, you must provide a contact information for the person or persons you have designated to carry out the required preparations to the Leisureville office.
- Your Primary responsibility is to prepare your house for painting.
   To help you do this, we have provided on the following page a Checklist that summarizes your required pre-painting preparation.

## PRE – PAINTING CHECKLIST

- Remove all vegetation, including vines that you have planted and that adhere to any surface of your home.
- Pull Back all vegetation that you have planted to at least 10" from any surface.
- Remove all decorative items hung on exterior wall surfaces, including nails and screws.
- Make all repairs necessary to the exterior of your home.
- When you receive your Notice to Paint from the painter, remove all window screens, close and lock all windows and doors, and place a rolled-up towel on each window sill and underneath all doors to prevent water from seeping in.
- Remove all furniture and personal items from your porch, patio and store these items inside your home or garage.
- Park all vehicles in your garage. If this is not possible, remove vehicles from your driveway or in front of your house to prevent over-spray.

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
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


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## Will you get dementia?

Many older Americans may inaccurately estimate their chances for developing dementia and do useless things to prevent it, recent research suggests. Nearly half of adults surveyed believed they were likely to develop dementia.

The results suggest many didn't understand the connection between physical health and brain health and how racial differences can affect dementia risk.

Large numbers of people who had rated their health as fair or poor thought their dementia chances were low. At the same time, many who said they were in excellent health said they were likely to develop the memory-robbing disease. Many said they tried at least one of four unproven memory-protecting methods, including taking supplements such as fish oil and ginkgo. The most popular strategy was doing crossword puzzles.

Mental stimulation is thought to help, but there is stronger evidence for more challenging activities than puzzles, such as playing chess, taking a class, reading about unfamiliar topics, said Dr. Keith Fargo, who oversees research and outreach programs at the Alzheimer's Association. He was not involved in the study.

Research has shown that regular exercise, a good diet, limiting your alcohol intake, and not smoking make dementia less likely. Supplements have not been shown to help.

"We really haven't done a good job of getting the word out that there really are things you can do to lower your risk," said Dr. Maust, the study's lead author and a geriatric psychiatrist at the University of Michigan.

A study asked people to assess their likelihood of developing dementia and whether they had discussed ways to prevent it with their doctor. Few said they had, regardless of their self-rated risk for dementia. The results raised concerns because doctors can help people manage and control conditions such as high blood pressure and diabetes that have been linked with dementia risk, Maust said.

Among those who said their physical health was only fair or poor, a large 40% thought they were at low risk for Alzheimer disease or other dementia.

One in three seniors die with Alzheimer's or other dementias, said the Alzheimer's Association, heretofore, there is no medicines or medical treatments proven to prevent it.

European studies have shown that healthy lifestyles may help prevent mental decline, and the Alzheimer's Association is sponsoring similar U.S. research. Jeopardy and Wheel of Fortune are excellent television programs to watch, even though you may not know the correct answers, the fact is you are putting your brain to work, which is always a good thing.

More whites than blacks or Hispanics surveyed believed they were likely to develop dementia and almost two-thirds of blacks said they were unlikely.

The study used data from the University of Michigan National Poll on Healthy Aging. Adults were surveyed on-line. Funding came from the AARP, the University of Michigan health system and the U.S. government grants.

## Herbal Corner ASCENDED LIVING - GOOD FATS

Good fats are essential to great health. However, just taking EFA supplements is not good enough and can be harmful. To be of benefit, you must be able to absorb them through the Intestinal tract. This can easily be accomplished by blending Flax oil with cottage cheese. The sulfur groups on the protein bind to the OMEGA 3 in the (FSO) flax seed oil and it is absorbed together. This is helpful in repairing the body in many chronic conditions such as arthritis, hypertension, diabetes and cancer. Lipoproteins can be found in all biochemically active tissues and always contain highly unsaturated fatty acids and sulfa rich proteins. It is also known that anesthetics and such drugs as barbiturates, sleeping pills and pain killers can separate highly unsaturated fatty acids from sulfur containing proteins and should be avoided when replenishing one's essential fatty acids. However, these good fats need to be activated in the body. Dr. Budwig discovered in the 50's that there are vitamins and mineral CO factors that aided the body in its use of these essential fatty acids. These co factors are Vitamin B3, B6, C and the minerals magnesium and zinc. These nutrients are all required by the body to make prostaglandins. It should also be noted that one should never put bad fats in the body. There may even be some evidence that taking the flax oil daily without the sulfa-based protein may even be harmful. The real problem however is the so-called bad fats. Polymerized pseudo fats of marine origin such as fish and whale oils that have been Radically altered by being subjected to high temperatures for use in margarines. These substances have been isolated from soft tumors and on the outside of the heart muscle at autopsy. The normal cells won't tolerate these fats and they are pushed outside the cells. One can also see that if these rancid or misshapen fats are used to repair the cell membrane then the cell life is shortened.

Here are a few recipes that can be used to replace deficient essential fatty acids.

- 1. Blend the following ingredients: 1 cup of whole milk organic cottage cheese, goat or sheep is the best, 4 TBS of unrefined cold pressed flaxseed oil 2 fresh peaches sliced or other fresh fruit, one tablespoon of raw honey from a non polluted source. And the juice from ½ lemon. To get a yogurt like consistency.
- 2. Blend the following into a drink that can be placed into a glass and enjoyed. 1 cup of unsweetened grape or pineapple juice, one banana, 1 1/2 cups frozen dark cherries ½ cup of whole milk organic cottage cheese, goat or sheep best, 1 cup plain nonfat organic yogurt ¼ cup of freshly ground organic flax seeds, 2 tablespoons raw wheat germ 4 TBS unrefined organic cold pressed flax oil, and 2 TBS of raw honey.

What I usually do is add 4TBS of the Flax oil into my blender with ½ cup of organic whole milk cottage cheese goat or sheep and 1 tsp. Raw honey blend well and enjoy.

These are not the only EFA's that are consumed and you can balance your hormones should you wish to point your metabolism in that direction. Good fats are needed to do that as well as putting the specific precursors and co-factors in place such as vitamin C. Note well that cottage cheese and flat leafed parsley are the only two foods that have the short chain amino acids with many sulfa side groups.

#### **The Meditation Corner**

#### **Light Body**

The last meditation corner spoke of light and I would like to mention a bit about this with respect to meditation. Salt to taste



Spread in a 9" pie pan and top with cheddar and mozzarella cheeses. Bake until hoot and bubbly, about 15 minutes. Serve hot with chips. Makes about 2-1/2 cups.
